

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SECOND SESSION-TWENTY-NINTH PARLIAMENT.

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- ADOPTION OF CHILDREN: Bill to make provision for the adoption of infants—(Mr. Slater).—Initiated and read a first time, 26 July, 1928, p. 22; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 7 Aug., p. 29; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 29 Aug., p. 40; further considered in Committee, 26 Sept., p. 61; further considered in Committee and reported with amendments; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time and further amendments made; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 10 Oct., p. 74; the Council's agreement to the Bill with amendments notified, 12 Dec., p. 116; amendments considered and agreed to, 13 Dec., pp. 121-2; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 43) recommending amendments in the Bill; amendments agreed to; His Excellency's Message transmitted to the Legislative Council and their concurrence requested, 18 Dec., p. 123; the Council's agreement to the amendments notified, 18 Dec., p. 128. - AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION ACTS AMENDMENT: Bill relating to agricultural education—(Mr. Pennington).—Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 32) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 4 Dec., 1929, p. 107; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 12 Dec., p. 117, debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 18 Dec., p. 128; the Council's agreement notified, 19 Dec., p. 130. (Assented to 27 December, 1928. Act No. 3611.)
- APPROPRIATION: Bill to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the service of the year ending on the 30th day of June, 1929, and to appropriate the supplies granted in this Session of Parliament-(Sir William McPherson).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and read a first time, 20 Dec., 1928, p. 133; read a second time and committed; considered in Committee; progress reported; the Chairman of Committees reported having ruled that an amendment to omit the words " Nine million three hundred and eight thousand four hundred and thirty pounds for " from clause 1, with a view of inserting in lieu thereof the words " Three million one hundred and two thousand eight hundred and ten pounds towards " was out of order; the Chair-man's ruling confirmed by Mr. Speaker; Bill further considered in Committee; progress reported; the Chairman of Committees reported having ruled that an amendment to add to the schedule the words "That, in the opinion of this immediately  $\mathbf{it}$ to necessary Committee, is

(Assented to 2 January, 1929. Act No. 3627.)
- BUILDERS REGISTRATION: Bill to provide for the registration of builders and for other purposes—(*Lieut.*. *Col. Forrest*).—Initiated and read a first time, 26 July, 1928, p. 24; read a second time and committed to a Select Committee; Committee appointed 23 Aug., p. 37; Progress Report, &c., presented, 20 Dec., p. 130.—Bill lapsed.
- BUSINESS AGENTS: Bill to provide for the licensing of business agents and their sub-agents and for other purposes—(Mr. Slater).—Initiated and read a first time, 26 July, 1928, p. 23; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 31 July. p. 25; debate resumed and adjourned, 16 Aug., p. 33; detate continued—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 21 Aug., p. 35; further considered in Committee and reported with amendments, 28 Aug., p. 39; as amended, considered. and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time and further amendments made; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 29 Aug., p. 40.—Bill not returned from the Legislative Council.

- LAND ACTS AMENDMENT: Bill to amend section 5 of the Land Act 1923—(Mr. Angus).—Initiated and read a first time, 19 Dec., 1928, p. 130; read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with an amendment; as amended, considered, and amendment agreed to; motion made, That this Bill be now read a third time, and, after debate, motion, That the question be now put, agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 21 Dec., p. 138; the Council's agreement notified, 21 Dec., p. 139. (Assented to 2 January, 1929. Act No. 3626.)

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR'S SPEECH.—Mr. Speaker reported that the House had that day attended His Excellency the Governor in the Legislative Council Chamber, when His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, for greater accuracy, obtained a copy as follows :—

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

You have been called together for the consideration of many matters of public importance which will be submitted to you for your deliberation.

After the adverse season experienced over the greater part of Victoria last year it is gratifying that seasonable prospects this year are more favorable.

As a result of the bountiful rain during the past few months, and the ready response made to the Government's appeal to wheat-growers for an extra million acres of wheat to be sown this season, there is every indication that, if normal conditions prevail, the coming wheat harvest will be one of the best in the history of the State. In consequence pessimism amongst primary producers caused by the partial failure of the rains in 1927 has been replaced by confidence and optimism.

The Government has formulated proposals for increasing the hospital accommodation of the metropolis. These proposals, providing for 260 additional beds, have been approved by the Charities Board and the University Council, and, generally, by the Committees of the Hospitals directly affected.

The Forest policy has been considerably developed during the past financial year; and plans for the future are based upon the assurance of a sustained annual increase of the yield in timber.

Many Bush Fire Brigades have been organized under the auspices of the Forests Commission; and motor patrols have been appointed and furnished with camping equipment and modern firefighting appliances.

To develop the eucalyptus oil industry an experimental plant has been established in the ironbark and grey box areas of the Bendigo district, with excellent results.

The various health activities of the State have been closely examined, and buildings under the control of the Department of Public Health have been renovated and added to, the additions including pavilions and administrative buildings at Mont Park and a new ward at Janefield; and a Tuberculosis Bureau is now in course of erection.

Infant welfare work has been extended, and District Health Officers have co-operated with School Medical Officers in the examination of school children.

There has been a steady expansion in the work of education. New school buildings in centres of growing population are being erected and existing buildings extended or reconstructed as rapidly as circumstances permit.

Tenders have been invited for the erection of a new University High School, and the construction of the building will shortly be begun.

Action has been taken by the Government to increase the dental staff of the Education Department so as to provide for the dental treatment of children over a wider area of the State. Three additional dental officers and three additional dental attendants will be appointed, and arrangements have been made to obtain two dental vans for country work.

The Apprenticeship Commission has been constituted in accordance with the legislation passed last Session.

The dairying industry has benefited to a very marked extent, as a result of the autumn rains. Recognizing that to obtain the fullest measure of agricultural output both scientific and administrative help must be made available to farmers, the Government has adopted a vigorous policy of assistance in both directions.

My Advisers are giving consideration to the question of re-organizing the lamb export trade on an effective co-operative basis.

The production of fruit in 1927-28 has been the highest on record. Approximately 1,000,000 cases of fruit are now in cool stores and will be placed on the market during the year.

The State Rivers and Water Supply Commission is giving effect to the Government's policy of increasing public water storages. The present capacity is 1,200,000 acre-feet, and with the works under construction will in a few years be raised to 2,500,000 acre-feet.

Areas in the Mallee comprising approximately 240,000 acres have been made available for settlement, of which 128,000 acres have already been surveyed. Settlers are also being placed on Crown lands in other parts of the State where land is suitable for settlement.

In view of the many problems that are arising it is proposed to decentralize the administration of land settlement by transferring experienced administrative officers to country centres.

Consequent upon the legislation passed last Session action has been taken in several localities to have Harbor Board Districts proclaimed. The Harbor Board District of Warrambool has been proclaimed and steps are being taken for the election of the local Board. Preliminary conferences have been held regarding the establishment of Harbor Boards at Portland, Welshpool, and Gippsland Lakes. An application for the constitution of a Board at Port Fairy has been received.

The bridges over the River Murray at Gonn Crossing and Euston, with respect to which the Board of Land and Works was the constructing authority, have been completed and are open for traffic. The New South Wales Government has controlled the construction of the bridges over that river at Mildura and Abbotsford under contract, and the Mildura Bridge has already been opened for road traffic.

With the view of meeting the increasing demand for the supply of electricity my Ministers are giving consideration to proposals for enlarging the activities of the State Electricity Commission. These proposals will involve an extension of the works at Yallourn and a duplication of the main transmission line.

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The Government has taken over from the Exhibition Trustees the Western Annexe of the Exhibition Building, and, by alterations, has made available 60,000 square feet of floor space, which will provide accommodation for the more efficient working of several Departments and will reduce the rent bill of the State.

The Government is proceeding with the erection of another building in order to promote departmental efficiency and effect further economies. The money made available by the Commonwealth in connexion with the occupation by the

The money made available by the Commonwealth in connexion with the occupation by the Commonwealth Parliament of the Parliament House of Victoria will be expended in the building of additions to Parliament House, and tenders for the work have been invited. The consolidation of the Victorian statute law by Mr. Justice Cussen is proceeding rapidly.

The consolidation of the Victorian statute law by Mr. Justice Cussen is proceeding rapidly. It is hoped that the necessary measures will be introduced into Parliament during this Session.

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

The partial failure of the wheat crop, the adverse conditions affecting other sections of primary production, the general financial depression, and the substantial decrease in railway revenue, have caused my Advisers concern; and prudent economy consistent with efficient administration has accordingly been exercised.

The Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the current financial year are now being prepared, and will be placed before you as early as practicable.

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

The problem of unemployment is world-wide, but the acute economic and industrial depression which Victoria, in common with the other States of the Commonwealth, has experienced during the past twelve months has considerably added to the number of people usually unemployed at this time of the year. In order to relieve the position the Government has taken steps to expedite railway and road construction and other public works.

One of the first measures to be submitted for your consideration will make provision for Unemployed Workers' Insurance.

A Bill with respect to a Rural Bank will be placed before you.

A measure to create one Authority in place of existing Municipalities and certain other public bodies in the metropolis will be introduced at an early date.

Bills providing for a Ministry of Transport and a Ministry of Health will be submitted to you.

A measure to revise the Electoral Districts Act passed by the last Parliament will be brought forward.

Legislation will be introduced to amend the Factories and Shops Acts, the Health Acts, and the Workers' Compensation Acts.

Proposals for amending the Motor Car Acts and the law relating to local government will be placed before you.

The question of removing the Newmarket Saleyards to a more suitable site has been investigated by my Ministers, and legislation dealing therewith will be proposed.

A comprehensive measure to alter the law in regard to weights and measures is being prepared.

A Bill dealing with the care and treatment of mental defectives will be introduced.

A Bill having for its object the establishment of a Public Service Classification and Efficiency Board will be laid before you.

Several other legislative proposals will be submitted, amongst these being Bills relating to Real Estate Agents, Business Agents, Farm Produce Agents, Justices, Marriage, County Courts, Children's Courts, Adoption of Children, Masseurs Registration, Nurses Registration, Tramways, Theatres, and Money Lenders.

I now leave you to your deliberations, and express the earnest hope that your labours may materially advance the welfare of the State and promote the prosperity and happiness of the people.

Delivery Notes given when Sheep are received at Abattoirs for Slaughter.

Any delivery note written out or caused to be written out by the proprietor of an abattoir pursuant to any law for the time being in force in respect of the receipt of sheep at such abattoir for slaughter, whether or not the said proprietor is entitled to or has any interest in such sheep or the carcasses or meat derived therefrom—

For every head of sheep so received—a stamp duty of Twopence or such less sum as is fixed from time to time by proclamation of the Governor in Council published in the *Government Gazette*.

And the said resolution was read a second time and agreed to by the House.

Ordered—That Mr. Slater and Mr. Cain do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing resolution.

- 3. STAMPS (SHEEP DUTY) BILL.—Mr. Slater then brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill to establish a Freezing Works Fund in the Treasury by means of Stamp Duties imposed upon Delivery Notes given when Sheep are received into Abattoirs for Slaughter and to provide for the Application of such Fund, and for other purposes"; and the said Bill was read a first time, ordered to be printed, and read a second time on Tuesday next.

a stamp duty of One penny: Provided that the stamp duty in respect of the purchase money of any one sheep whether sold singly or as part of a lot shall not exceed Two pence.

- (a) On all income derived by any person (not being a company) from personal exertion—
  - (i) where such income does not exceed Five hundred pounds
    - for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof, Fourpence and a halfpenny; and
  - (ii) where such income exceeds Five hundred pounds
    - for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof up to Five hundred pounds, Fivepence and a halfpenny;
      - for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof over Five hundred pounds and up to One thousand pounds, Sixpence and a halfpenny;
    - for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof over One thousand pounds and up to One thousand five hundred pounds, Sevenpence and a halfpenny; and
    - for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof over One thousand five hundred pounds, Eightpence and a halfpenny;

- (b) On all income derived by any person (not being a company) from the produce of property-
  - (i) where such income does not exceed Five hundred pounds-

for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof, Ninepence; and (ii) where such income exceeds Five hundred pounds-

- for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof up to Five hundred pounds, Elevenpence;
  - for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof over Five hundred pounds and up to One thousand pounds, Thirteenpence; for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof over One
  - thousand pounds and up to One thousand five hundred pounds, Fifteenpence; and
  - for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof over One thousand five hundred pounds, Seventeenpence;
- (c) In the case of any person (not being a company) there shall be payable an additional tax as follows
  - (i) Where the income, whether from personal exertion or the produce of property or both, exceeds Eight hundred pounds but does not exceed One thousand pounds
    - an amount equal to ten per centum of the total amount of tax otherwise chargeable;
  - (ii) Where the income, whether from personal exertion or the produce of property or both, exceeds One thousand pounds but does not exceed One thousand two hundred and fifty pounds
    - an amount equal to twelve and a half per centum of the total amount of tax otherwise chargeable;
  - (iii) Where the income, whether from personal exertion or the produce of property or both, exceeds One thousand two hundred and fifty pounds but does not exceed Two thousand two hundred pounds
    - an amount equal to fifteen per centum of the total amount of tax otherwise chargeable ;
  - (iv) Where the income, whether from personal exertion or the produce of property or both, exceeds Two thousand two hundred pounds but does not exceed Five thousand pounds-

an amount equal to twenty per centum of the total amount of tax otherwise chargeable; and

- (v) Where the income, whether from personal exertion or the produce of property
  - or both, exceeds Five thousand poundsan amount equal to twenty-five per centum of the total amount of tax otherwise chargeable;
- (d) On the income of a company (other than a mutual life assurance company)--for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof, Eighteenpence;
- (e) On the income of a mutual life assurance company-
  - (i) with respect to its mutual life assurance business only, for every pound sterling
  - of the taxable amount of income, Twelvepence ; and (ii) with respect to its other business, for every pound sterling of the taxable amount of income, Eighteenpence :

Provided that, where the articles of association of a life assurance company provide that a percentage of its profits is to be distributed among the life assurance policy-holders of the company, then, for the purposes of this resolution, the rate for every pound sterling of the amount represented by the like percentage of the taxable amount of the income of the company from life assurance business shall be Twelvepence and the rate for every pound sterling of the taxable amount of the remainder of the income of the company shall be Eighteenpence :

Provided further that where any person (not being a company) derives income both from personal exertion and from the produce of property and the total income so derived exceeds Five hundred pounds, then for the purposes of this resolution the rate for every pound sterling of the taxable amount of income derived from each source shall be the same as if the income from each such source exceeded Five hundred pounds.

Notwithstanding anything in the foregoing provisions of this resolution, where a person would, apart from this provision of this resolution, be liable to pay income tax of an amount less than Five shillings the tax payable by that person shall be Five shillings.

And the said resolution was read a second time and agreed to by the House.

Ordered -That Mr. Hogan and Mr. Tunnecliffe do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing resolution.

Where the unimproved value or total unimproved value of all land or lands of any owner exceeds Two hundred and fifty pounds the rate of tax payable thereon for the said year shall be: On every pound sterling of its unimproved value— One half-penny;

2. That in addition to any duty of land tax so payable there shall in the case of each such owner be charged levied collected and paid for the use of His Majesty in aid of the consolidated revenue for the year ending on the thirty-first day of December One thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine a super-tax equal to five per centum of the amount of the duty of land tax so payable:

Provided that the minimum amount of tax and super-tax combined payable for the said year by any taxpayer assessed under the Land Tax Acts shall be Two shillings and sixpence.

And the said resolution was read a second time and agreed to by the House.

(2) Where an adoption order is discharged then, subject to conditions (if any)

named in the discharging order, the child and its natural parents and the adopter shall be deemed for all purposes to be restored to the same position inter se as existed immediately before the adoption order was made:

Provided that such restoration shall not affect anything lawfully done or any right or interest which became vested in the child while the adoption order was in force :

Provided further that the said Court may, if in all the circumstances of the case it thinks proper, direct that the child be committed to the care of the Children's Welfare Department, or, if the child was at the time of its adoption a ward of the Department within the meaning of the Children's Welfare Acts or was under the guardianship of any person or institution to whose care children may be committed pursuant to Part VIII. of the Children's Welfare Act 1915 and is under the age of eighteen years, direct that the child be recommitted to the care of the Children's Welfare Department or to such other guardianship (as the case may be).

And the said amendments were read a second time and agreed to by the House.

#### FRIDAY, 21st DECEMBER, 1928.

1. The House met pursuant to adjournment.-Mr. Speaker took the Chair and read the Prayer.

2. APPROPRIATION BILL.—Read a second time, after debate, and committed; considered in Committee. Committee reported progress; to sit again this day.

Mr. Solly reported that in Committee he gave a ruling upon the question whether an amendment moved in the Appropriation Bill by the honorable member for Collingwood could be admitted. He ruled that, according to Parliamentary procedure and precedents, the amendment was strictly out of order. He did so because, as Chairman, he was desirous of conducting the proceedings on proper lines. The amendment was as follows —That the words "Nine million three hundred and eight thousand four hundred and thirty pounds for" be omitted from clause 1, with the view of inserting in lieu thereof the words "Three million one hundred and two thousand eight hundred ' and ten pounds towards." With his concurrence the Committee now desired to ask the Speaker's opinion upon that ruling.

And, after debate---

Mr. Speaker said—" When the honorable member for Collingwood submitted his amendment in the course of the debate on the second reading I said that it was not the proper stage to do more than indicate his intention of moving it in Committee. The statements made by honorable members in that respect are correct. I have to confess that in my long experience I have never known an amendment of this kind to be moved to an Appropriation Bill, either in the House or in Committee. There is no record in the history of this Parliament of such an amendment having been moved. As we have nothing in our records to guide us, we must resort to the practice of the House of Commons. The position is clear. I do not think that the honorable member for Collingwood meant that I wished to misdirect the House.

Mr. TUNNECLIFFE.—Not intentionally.

The SPEAKER.-Yesterday the House went into Committee of Ways and Means, and the following resolution was agreed to :---

That towards making good the Supply granted to His Majesty for the service of the year ending on the 30th day of June, 1929, the sum of £9,308,430 be granted out of the Consolidated Revenue of Victoria.

That resolution was reported to the House and adopted. As a result, the Bill known as the Appropriation Bill was brought in, and its first reading was carried in the early hours this morning. The Appropriation Bill is the machinery measure to carry out what was decided by the Committee of Ways and Means, and also by the House itself. As the second reading of this Bill has been carried the measure is properly before the House. That being so, the question arises whether an amendment can be moved. There is no precedent in our records of any amendment being moved either in the House or in Committee for raising the amount of the appropriation. Three cases that are exactly similar to that which has now arisen here happened in the House of Commons. On the 21st of December, 1888, the Chairman of Committees there said—

This is a Committee of the whole House, and it is not open to a Committee of the whole House to vary or negative any resolution which is a resolution of the House itself. I understand the honorable gentleman wishes to vary or alter a resolution of the House itself. That cannot be done.

On the 23rd of August, 1894, when the Consolidated Fund (Appropriation) Bill was being discussed in the House of Commons, Mr. Little desired to submit an amendment, but the Speaker, the Right Honorable Arthur Wellesley Peel, said--

The honorable member cannot move the omission of an item in the Appropriation Bill, and therefore he is out of order.

On the 27th of July, 1917, when Mr. Whitley, who subsequently became the Speaker, was the Chairman of Committees, a similar matter was raised, by notice, and of course there was time to look up authorities. On that occasion the Chairman said—

The amendments standing on the Paper in the name of the honorable member for North Somerset (Mr. King), I am afraid, cannot be entertained, because this Bill is introduced on an order of Committee of Ways and Means. Therefore the figures contained in the Bill must correspond to the resolution passed in Ways and Means, and it is not competent for honorable members to make them differ.

I support the ruling given by the Chairman of Committees. As there has been no precedent in this House, we have to be guided by the precedents of the House of Commons. The Chairman's ruling is in order. I should add that when the motion 'That this Bill be now read a third time' is moved there is nothing to prevent an amendment being proposed to omit the words after 'That' with the view of inserting certain other words.

Mr. HOGAN.—I wish to draw your attention, Mr. Speaker, to the fact that an amendment has been moved in this Chamber to an Appropriation Bill. Your statement that such an amendment has never been moved before is not correct. I moved such an amendment on the 16th of December, 1921, when Sir John Mackey was Speaker. The incident is recorded on page 2147 of Vol. 159 of *Hansard*. On that occasion I moved—

That, in the opinion of this House, it is necessary to establish a Fair Prices Commission for the purpose of protecting the producers and the consumers against the exploitation of the profiteers of this State. That amendment was accepted and debated. Eventually the Chairman said-

I suggest that the honorable member for Warrenheip temporarily withdraw his amendment, and move its insertion at the end of the Second Schedule.

I did so. In this instance we wish to move that a moratorium measure be passed to protect the settlers. In 1921 Mr. A. A. Billson was the Chairman of Committees. *Hansard* shows that when the Second Schedule was reached I then moved the amendment which I have already read. The amendment was accepted, debated, and voted upon, as recorded in *Hansard* :---

The Committee divided on Mr. Hogan's amendment (Mr.A. A. Billson (Ovens) in the chair).

As the records show, we were in Committee on the 16th of December, 1921, and were dealing with an Appropriation Bill. I moved an amendment in Committee. The amendment was accepted, debated, and voted upon. Therefore, the information which you, Mr. Speaker, have been furnished with, that an amendment had never been moved in an Appropriation Bill, is, as you will see, incorrect. Such an amendment has been moved before in Committee. That is my case. I submit that I have proved that the course we are taking is in accordance with the precedent which has been established. We are doing something which has been done before—done by myself within the recollection of many honorable members now present. I therefore think that your ruling should be reconsidered in the light of the additional information that I have submitted for your consideration.

The SPEAKER.—I am glad that the Leader of the Opposition has called attention to this point. I remember the incident to which he referred very clearly; and, as the Premier has stated, that incident cannot be regarded as comparable with the present position. The Leader of the Opposition moved a particular amendment, but that amendment was an expression of opinion in respect of certain suggested legislation that he thought Parliament should take up. The position that has now arisen is entirely different. When I gave my ruling a few moments ago, I was speaking from memory. I asked the officers of the House whether they could recollect any similar incident in connexion with an Appropriation Bill—the moving of an amendment altering the amounts. The amendment moved by the honorable member for Collingwood is for reducing the amounts. The amendment moved by the honorable member for Collingwood is for reducing the figures contained in the Appropriation Bill. Following the precedent of the House of Commons, the figures contained in the Appropriation of different figures. The amendment of the honorable member for Collingwood is to alter the amount that the Committee of Ways and Means, and the House, said was necessary for the financial year ending the 30th of June. In accordance with the resolution carried in Committee of Ways and Means and adopted by the House, the Appropriation Bill was brought in, and the second reading has been carried. Following the practice of the House of Commons, it is not competent for the House, having already determined by the adoption of the report of the Committee of Ways and Means, and incorporated the appropriation recommended in that resolution in the Bill, which has been read a second time. Therefore, the illustration given by the Leader of the Opposition as to what occurred in 1921 does not apply. He then moved on the Second Schedule—

That the following words be added to the schedule :-- 'That, in the opinion of this Committee, it is considered necessary to establish a Fair Prices Commission for the purpose of

protecting the producers and the consumers against the profiteers and exploiters of this State.' That was a concrete expression of opinion, but it had nothing to do with the amount specified in the Appropriation Bill itself."

Bill further considered in Committee.

Committee reported progress ; to sit again this day.

- Mr. Solly reported that in Committee Mr. Hogan had moved the following amendment :--That the following words be added to the schedule :--- "That, in the opinion of this Committee, it is necessary to immediately extend the operation of the Postponement of Payments Act, No. 3571, of 1927 in a modified form for another year beyond the date of its expiration on the 28th day of February, 1929." He (Mr. Solly) ruled that the amendment was out of order, as the House had agreed to the Estimates as submitted. He contended that if this amendment were agreed to it would nullify the resolution that was carried by the Committee of Ways and Means and adopted by the House. With his concurrence the Committee now desired to ask the Speaker's opinion upon that ruling.
- Mr. Hogan said—" Mr. Speaker, I direct your attention to the precedent for my action. It will be found in *Hansard* of 1921, Vol. 159, at page 2147. The Appropriation Bill of 1921 was then under discussion in Committee and, curious to relate, the present Treasurer was in charge of the measure. I moved—

That, in the opinion of this House, it is necessary to establish a Fair Prices Commission for the purpose of protecting the producers and the consumers against the exploitation of the profiteers of this State.

Debate ensued on my motion, and the then Chairman, Mr. A. A. Billson, said-

I suggest that the honorable member for Warrenheip temporarily withdraw his amendment, and move its insertion at the end of the Second Schedule.

-

The Hansard report continues-

Mr. HOGAN.—Very well.

The amendment, by leave, was withdrawn.

Second Schedule— Mr. HOGAN.—I move-

T. HOGAN. --- I MOVE----

That the following words be added to the schedule :--- 'That, in the opinion of this Committee, it is considered necessary to establish a Fair Prices Commission for the purpose of protecting the producers and consumers against the profiteers and exploiters of this State.'

My motion was debated, and the Committee divided. The division list is set out on page 2152 of *Hansard*, Vol. 159. I submit that there is a difference between the amendment on which you, Sir, are now asked to rule and the question on which you ruled previously to-day. The amendment of the honorable member for Collingwood was to reduce the amount set out in the Appropriation Bill. My amendment does not attempt to reduce the amount set out in the Appropriation Bill, or annul something to which the House agreed yesterday. I have moved an amendment, as I moved one in 1921, when the Appropriation Bill was in Committee. The amendment has no resemblance to that moved by the honorable member for Collingwood which you ruled out of order on the ground that it would annul what the House had agreed to yesterday. I submit that my amendment is in order.

The SPEAKER.—Was the Committee dealing with the schedule at the time the Leader of the Opposition moved his amendment ?

MR. SOLLY.-No; the Committee was dealing with clause 1.

The SPEAKER.---I think the schedule should have been before the Committee.

Mr. SOLLY.—As Chairman of Committees, I desire to point out that the Leader of the Opposition quoted a precedent based on an amendment that he moved in 1921, when the Appropriation Bill of that year was in Committee. He moved an amendment then, and the then Chairman ruled that it was in order. I submit that, because the Chairman at that time ruled that the particular amendment was in order, it does not compel me to rule that the amendment moved to-day by the honorable member is in order. We must bear in mind that Speakers and Chairmen of Committees can make mistakes. I contend that the Bill before the House should not be altered in any shape or form in Committee, because the Estimates on which the Bill is based have been agreed to. I consider that an amendment can be moved only on the third reading, and I have directed the attention of the Leader of the Opposition to that view.

....

The SPEAKER.—The Leader of the Opposition has referred to an incident which occurred on the 16th of December, 1921, and has claimed that that was a precedent which ought to be applicable to the present circumstances. As he explained, at the suggestion of the then Chairman the amendment referred to was moved at the end of the Second Schedule. As the Chairman of Committees has pointed out, Speakers, Chairmen of Committees, and private members are all liable to mistakes, the question being whether, when we make a mistake, it is an honest one. I consider that the ruling that I gave earlier should apply, following the precedent of the House of Commons which should be our guide. This Bill deals with the appropriation of money. I support the Chairman's ruling that the amendment moved by the Leader of the Opposition is not admissible, although on the previous occasion to which reference has been made the amendment was accepted by the then Chairman. An error was made on that occasion which we should not repeat. Following the precedent of the House of Commons, it will be competent for the Leader of the Opposition or some other honorable member to move, on the question that the Bill be now read a third time, any amendment which I, as Speaker, think is pertinent and can be admitted.

Mr. HOGAN.—I was informed, after explicit inquiry which I made in regard to a matter which we dealt with a little while ago, that where precedents exist in our own House we follow those precedents. Only in cases where there are no precedents in this House do we follow those of the House of Commons or Sir Erskine May's *Parliamentary Practice*. That opinion was authoritatively conveyed to me, and I direct your attention, Mr. Speaker, to that fact.

The SPEAKER.—.The statement made by the Leader of the Opposition was in a general sense correct. We follow precedents in our own House when they exist, and, failing that, we follow the experience and practice in the House of Commons. I have looked at the report in *Hansard* referring to the incident which occurred in December, 1921. The amendment was accepted by the Chairman; there was no debate, nor were any points raised along the lines which the House has been discussing this afternoon.

Sir WILLIAM MCPHERSON.—Was the ruling referred to the Speaker?

The SPEAKER.—No. With the Clerk I have gone into the matter, and I find that in the House of Commons an amendment has been moved on the third reading. As I have already said, that will be the time for any honorable member to move an amendment."

Bill further considered in Committee and reported without amendment.

Motion made and question proposed—That this Bill be now read a third time (Sir William McPherson). Amendment proposed—That all the words after "That" be omitted with a view of inserting in place thereof the words "this House is of opinion that the Government should introduce a two months"

#### THURSDAY, 6TH SEPTEMBER, 1928.

No. 4. -Unemployed Workers Insurance Bill-Clause 5 as amended.

(1) There shall be established and kept in the Treasury an account to be called the "Unemployment Insurance Fund" (in this Act referred to as "the fund").

(2) All payments in respect of sustenance allowances and of the administration of this Act shall be made out of the fund : Provided that after the first financial year the amount payable out of the fund in any financial year in respect of the cost of the administration of this Act shall not exceed Six per centum of the moneys paid into the fund during the financial year.

(3) The fund shall be constituted in part by contributions paid by workers (including workers employed by the Crown), "in part by contributions paid by employers" (including the Crown as employer), and in part by moneys contributed by the State.

(4) Subject to this Act-

- (a) every worker (other than a person whose employment is of a casual nature and who is employed for less than three days in a week otherwise than for the purposes of the employer's trade or business); and
- (b) every employer of any such worker-

shall pay contributions to the fund at the prescribed rates: Provided that no person while in receipt of sustenance allowance under this Act shall be liable to pay any contribution to the fund.

(5) Except where otherwise prescribed the contributions to the fund payable by a worker shall in the first instance be paid on his behalf by his employer who shall notwithstanding any Act or contract to the contrary be entitled to recover any sum so paid by deducting the same from any wages or other moneys due by him to the worker.

(6) Notwithstanding any contract to the contrary, no employer shall be entitled to-

(a) deduct from the wages of or from other moneys due by him to any worker; or

(b) otherwise recover from such worker by any legal process-

the contributions payable by the employer to the fund.

(7) (a) The total of the contributions to be paid by workers "not employed by the Crown" and the total of the contributions to be paid by employers (other than the Crown) and the total of the moneys to be contributed by the State (so far as relating to workers not employed by the Crown and to employers other than the Crown) shall be of equal amount, so that such workers such employers and the State shall each contribute one-third part of the total contributions required to be made to the fund by such workers such employers and, pursuant to this paragraph, the State ;

No. 1.—Unemployed Workers Insurance Bill—Clause 12.

(1) Notwithstanding any provision in any Act the Governor in Council may by notice in the Government Gazette from time to time set apart and appropriate any unoccupied Crown lands for the purpose of establishing thereon labour farms.

(2) The Minister on the recommendation of the Council may from time to time appoint for any labour farm an overseer and such other officers as he thinks necessary.

- (3) Subject to the Council the overseer of any labour farm-
  - (a) shall manage and conduct the same :
  - (b) for that purpose shall have all the powers and authorities necessary for the efficient and orderly management and conduct thereof :
  - (c) may establish and manage any trade or industry on the farm, and may, subject to the directions of the Council, dispose of the proceeds thereof.
  - (4) (a) The Council may admit into a labour farm any man (hereinafter referred to as a farm labourer) who in the opinion of the Council is normally unemployable and who is otherwise without means of support;
    - (b) When admitted to a labour farm every farm labourer shall be entitled to such benefits as are provided by the rules of the farm while be complies with the rules and conforms to the discipline of the farm :
    - (c) Every farm labourer shall on admission to a labour farm give to the overseer particulars of his trade or calling, his place of birth, his length of residence in Victoria, and such other information concerning himself as the overseer may and is hereby empowered to require of him, and such particulars shall be entered by the overseer in a book to be kept by him :
    - (d) Every farm labourer shall be paid for the work done by him at the farm such wages as the Council fixes;
    - (e) Any farm labourer who while physically fit to work refuses without just cause or excuse to do the work allotted to him by the overseer shall be forthwith dismissed from the farm and shall not be admitted into another labour farm or receive any allowance from the fund.
  - (5) (a) All moneys received by the Council in pursuance of the provisions of this section and all moneys received by it from appropriations by Parliament for the purpose of labour farms shall be paid into a bank to the credit of a trust account in the name of the Council;

- (b) The moneys standing to the credit of such account may be expended by the Council—
  - (i) in paying wages for work done by farm labourers at labour farms
  - (ii) in paying for the erection construction and maintenance of necessary buildings erections works and conveniences upon and in connexion with labour farms :
  - (iii) in purchasing provisions, clothing, building materials, stock, seed, agricultural implements, tools and all things necessary for the proper working of labour farms :
  - (iv) in paying the salary or wages of the overseers and other officers of labour farms appointed under sub-section (2) of this section.
- (6) (a) Notwithstanding anything in the Licensing Acts no licence or club certificate authorizing the sale of any liquor within the meaning of the said Acts shall be granted within the boundaries of a labour farm, and no licence or permission shall authorize the sale within such boundaries of any such liquor by any form of agency or in any way whatever:
  - (b) Any person who sells or brings any such intoxicating liquor within the boundaries of a labour farm shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Fifty pounds :

Provided that this provision shall not extend to prohibit the bringing in or use of any such intoxicating liquor as a medicine prescribed by a legally qualified medical practitioner.

7) The Council may from time to time make alter and rescind rules with respect to any or all of the following matters, namely :-

- (a) The rates of wages for work to be paid to farm labourers at labour farms :
  - (b) The cleanliness good order and sanitation of labour farms :

  - (c) The maintenance of order and discipling among farm labourers at labour farms; (d) The penalty (including if thought fit expulsion from the labour farm, whether with or without any pecuniary penalty) for breaches of such rules, provided that no pecuniary penalty under such rules shall be more than Five pounds :
  - (e) Generally, for the better carrying out of the purposes and provisions of this section whether hereinbefore specifically authorized or not.
- (8) All rules made under this section shall be published in the Government Gazette.

No. 2. Clause 13 as amended.

(1) Every unemployed worker (whether or not his recent or usual employment has been with an employer within the meaning of this Act) shall have the right to apply to be registered and to be registered for employment at a labour exchange established pursuant to this Act.

- (2) Subject to the provisions hereinafter mentioned-
  - (a) if after the expiration of seven days from the date of his registration for employment any worker has not been provided with work the Council shall endeavour to procure work for him-
    - (i) for at least a period or periods equivalent on the average to twelve days in every four weeks until such time as he finds suitable regular employment : and \* \* at the rate of payment equal to the then minimum rate of payment prescribed for workers under any award of the Commonwealth Court of Conciliation and Arbitration or any determination of a wages loard or of the Court of Industrial Appeals for the city town or district wherein he may be employed for work of a like description;
  - (b) if at the expiration of fourteen days from the date of his registration for employment as aforesaid the Council fails so to procure work for him he shall (subject to this section) have the right to receive a sustenance allowance at the rate appropriate to his case and subject to the provisions set forth in the Schedule to this Act, but no person shall receive sustenance allowance who has not contributed in full to the fund for a period of at least six months prior to his application for such allowance : Provided that the Council may with the approval of the Governor in Council make

rules providing that a contributor to the fund who has contributed for less than six months may receive sustenance allowance at a proportionately reduced rate based on the duration of his payment of full contribution to the fund :

Provided further that the Governor in Council by proclamation may from time to time make such alterations in or additions to the Schedule to this Act or of any of the rates classes or other particulars or provisions thereof as he thinks fit, whereupon the said Schedule as so altered or added to shall be substituted for the existing Schedule to this Act; but no proclamation altering the rate of sustenance allowance per week as specified in the table in the Schedule to this Act shall be made hereunder unless previously accommended by a resolution of both Houses of Parliament.

- (3) Every proclamation under the last preceding sub-section of this section-
  - (a) shall be published in the Government Gazette :
  - (b) shall take effect on the date of such publication or on a later date specified in the proclamation; and
  - (c) shall be laid before both Houses of Parliament as soon as may be after it is made.
- (4) No sustenance allowance shall be receivable or be received by-
  - (a) any person who is in receipt of an old-age pension or an invalid pension under the laws of the Commonwealth; or
  - (b) any person who is in receipt of any other pension income or payment whatsoever at the rate of Fifty-two pounds a year or upwards which does not depend on his personal exertions or who is ordinarily and mainly dependent for his livelihood upon some other person: Provided that the sustenance allowance receivable by any person in receipt of any pension income or payment referred to in this paragraph, which is at a less rate than Fifty-two pounds a year, shall be diminished *pro rata* according to the amount of such pension income or payment; or
    (c) any worker who has not been *bona fide* resident in Victoria continuously for the six
  - (c) any worker who has not been *bona fide* resident in Victoria continuously for the six months immediately prior to the date of his registration under sub-section (1) of this section :

Provided that a worker who is a *bona fide* resident in Victoria but who has been temporarily absent from Victoria during a portion of the period of six months immediately prior to the date of his registration under the said sub-section (1) may in the absolute discretion of the Council be paid such sustenance allowance as the Council thinks proper under the circumstances; or

(d) any worker (whether or not employed by way of manual labour) who during the twelve months preceding his application for such allowance has received remuneration in respect of his employment exceeding, in the case of a married worker, Three hundred pounds. or, in the case of any other worker, Two hundred and fifty pounds.

(5) The right to receive sustenance allowance shall be subject to the following conditions and exceptions :---

(a) If the worker at any time after his registration without reasonable excuse refuses or has refused to accept any work offered to him he shall not for at least thirty "days " after such refusal be entitled to receive any such allowance :

- (g) Prescribing conditions under which any person having paid any such fee in respect of any motor car may be permitted to occupy a position by the same motor car on any of such standing places at any time or times during the day or the period (as the case may be) for which the fee was paid; and
- (h) Prescribing the duties of officers or attendants for such standing places.

(3) The Marriage Acts shall with such alterations modifications and substitutions as are necessary be read and construed and have effect accordingly.

(4) Every proclamation under this section -

- (a) shall be published in the Government Gazette ;
- (b) shall take effect on the date of the publication of the proclamation or a later date specified therein :
- (c) may be rescinded revoked amended or varied by like proclamation;
- (d) shall so long as it is not rescinded or revoked have the like force and effect as if enacted in this Act : and

#### No. 2.—Closer Settlement Bill—Clause 5.

(1) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the Closer Settlement Acts the Land Acts or the Discharged Soldiers Settlement Acts, upon the application of any discharged soldier within the meaning of the last-mentioned Acts who—

- (a) is the holder of a conditional purchase lease or leases under the Closer Settlement Acts as amended or affected by the Discharged Soldiers Settlement Acts; or
- (b) holds a qualification certificate under the last-mentioned Acts and is the holder of a selection purchase lease or leases or a conditional purchase lease or leases or an agricultural allotment lease or leases or a grazing allotment lease or leases under the Land Acts as amended or affected by the Discharged Soldiers Settlement Acts—

the Minister on the recommendation of the Closer Settlement Board may authorize the area of the land held by the applicant as aforesaid to be increased (in the event of the applicant surrendering his lease or leases and a new lease being issued to him as hereinafter provided) so as to be an area—

- (i) in the case of any allotment under the Closer Settlement Acts as so amended or affected—not exceeding in the whole in value the maximum value authorized by the Closer Settlement Acts as so amended or affected to be held by such person; or
- (ii) in any other case hereinbefore referred to—not exceeding in the whole in area the maximum area or in value the maximum value (if any) authorized by the Land Acts as so amended or affected to be held in any such case by such person.

(2) Thereupon the applicant may surrender his lease or leases, and the Governor in Council may if he thinks fit accept such surrender and issue a conditional purchase lease or a selection purchase lease (as the case may be) for the original area or areas together with such additional area as the Closer Settlement Board approves.

(3) Such new lease-

- (a) shall be for such a term of years as is agreed upon by the lessee and the said Board, not exceeding thirty years in addition to the expired portion of the term of the surrendered lease or (where there are more surrendered leases than one) of the term of the earliest of such leases ;
- (b) may be dated to commence on the same date as the surrendered lease or (where there are more surrendered leases than one) the same date as the earliest of such leases, or on such other date as is agreed upon by the lessee and the said Board;
- (c) shall provide for the amount and payment by the lessee of instalments or rent (as the case requires) in respect of the new lease; and
- (d) shall, so far as consistent with the law for the time being in force, be subject to the like conditions and provisions in other respects as the surrendered lease or leases.

(4) The Governor in Council may if he thinks fit direct that the whole or any part of the instalments or (as the case may be) the rent paid under the surrendered lease or leases in respect of any land included in the new lease shall be deemed to have been paid on account of the new lease.

(5) All substantial and permanent improvements made to the satisfaction of the Closer Settlement Board or the Board of Land and Works (as the case may be) on any part of the area included in the new lease and any occupation of the land comprised in the surrendered lease or leases shall be deemed and taken to be improvements or occupation under the new lease.

(6) The Governor in Council may in the new lease make any necessary adjustments (whether as to value or area or both or otherwise) accordingly.

## MINUTES OF THE PROCEEDINGS JOINT SITTING

#### HELD IN THE

### LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY CHAMBER.

#### TUESDAY, 18TH DECEMBER, 1928.

#### The Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly having, pursuant to resolution, assembled in the Legislative Assembly Chamber:---

1. ELECTION OF PRESIDENT.—The Premier, the Honorable Sir William McPherson, M.L.A., rose and moved—That the Honorable Sir Francis Grenville Clarke, President of the Legislative Council, be appointed President of this Joint Sitting, which motion, being seconded by the Chief Secretary, the Honorable Dr. S. S. Argyle, M.L.A., was resolved in the affirmative.

The Honorable Sir F. G. Clarke, having expressed his acknowledgments for the honour which had been conferred upon him, then took the Chair.

2. RULES OF PROCEDURE.—The Premier, the Honorable Sir William McPherson, M.L.A., submitted the following rules of procedure for the consideration of honorable members, and moved that they be adopted as the rules of procedure of this Joint Sitting :--

1. On any debate arising the same shall be conducted according to parliamentary usage.

2. A Member, addressing himself to the President, shall propose a person to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the death of Senator David Andrew, and such proposition shall be duly seconded. When any person is so proposed his proposer shall state to the Members present that such person is willing to hold the vacant place if chosen.

3. If only one person be proposed and seconded the President shall declare---" That has been chosen to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the death of Senator David Andrew."

4. If more than one person be proposed and seconded the person to hold the vacant place shall, subject to the following rules, be chosen by ballot.

5. Before giving directions to proceed with the ballot the President shall ask if any Member desires to propose any other person to hold the vacant place, and, no other person being proposed, the ballot shall be proceeded with, after which no person shall be proposed.

6. Each Member present shall be provided with a ballot-paper certified by the Clerks of the two Houses, and shall write thereon the name of one of the persons duly proposed, and shall place his ballot-paper in the ballot-box.

7. If two or more persons be proposed and seconded, the proposer of each of such persons shall name some Member present to be a scrutineer. The scrutineers, with the Clerks of the two Houses, shall retire and ascertain the number of votes for each person; and the scrutineers shall make a written report of the result to the President.

8. No informal vote shall be taken into account.

9. If on the first ballot no person shall have received an absolute majority of the votes polled, a second ballot shall be taken, and the name of the person who shall have received the fewest votes at the first ballot shall be excluded; but if at the first ballot the names of only two persons be submitted and the number of votes for such persons be equal, the scrutineers shall by drawing lots determine which of such persons shall be chosen to hold the vacant place, and the person whose name shall be first drawn shall be deemed to have been duly chosen.

10. Until one of the persons proposed obtains an absolute majority of the votes polled, or (as the case may be) is chosen by lot to hold the vacant place, successive ballots shall be taken, and at each such ballot the name of the person who shall have the fewest votes at the preceding ballot shall be excluded.

11. If on any ballot it shall be necessary to decide between two or more persons as to which one is to be excluded from a subsequent ballot through the number of votes for such persons being equal, a special ballot shall be taken at which the names of only those persons shall be submitted, and the name of the person having the fewest votes at such special ballot shall be excluded; but if on any special ballot it shall be necessary to decide between two or more persons as to which one is to be excluded from a subsequent ballot through the number of votes for such persons being equal, the scrutineers by drawing lots shall determine which one of such persons shall be excluded, and the name of the person last drawn shall be excluded.

12. If at any ballot, other than the first ballot or a special ballot hereinbefore provided for, the names of only two persons be submitted and the number of votes for such persons be equal, the scrutineers shall, by drawing lots, determine which of those persons shall be chosen to hold the vacant place, and the person whose name shall be first drawn shall be deemed to have been duly chosen.

13. As soon as any person obtains an absolute majority of the votes polled, or (as the case may be) is chosen by lot to hold the vacant place, the President shall declare—" That

has been chosen to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the death of Senator David Andrew."

14. The President shall in all cases be entitled to a vote.

15. The records of the proceedings and the ballot-papers shall be retained by the Clerk of the Parliaments of the State of Victoria, who shall be the custodian thereof, and shall keep the ballot-papers safely for one year and thereafter destroy them.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

3. SCRUTINEERS' REPORTS.—The Honorable J. Cain, M.L.A., moved—That the number of votes received by each candidate be disclosed by the scrutineers in their reports.

Question-put and resolved in the affirmative.

4. PERSONS PROPOSED TO HOLD THE VACANT PLACE IN THE SENATE.--The President announced that, the rules having been adopted, he was now prepared to receive proposals from any honorable member with regard to a person to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the death of Senator David Andrew.

The Honorable J. Allan, M.L.A., proposed Robert Charles Dunlop Elliott, Esquire, as the person to hold the vacant place, and stated that such person was willing to hold the vacant place, if chosen, and named the Honorable E. J. Mackrell, M.L.A., to be a scrutineer, which proposal was seconded by A. L. N. Walter, Esquire, M.L.A.

- The Honorable A. M. Zwar, M.L.C., proposed Richard Hartley Smith Abbott, Esquire, as the person to hold the vacant place, and stated that such person was willing to hold the vacant place, if chosen, and named the Honorable H. Keck, M.L.C., to be a scrutineer, which proposal was seconded by the Honorable W. C. Angliss, M.L.C.
- 5. BALLOT.—The President having asked if any member desired to propose any other person to hold the vacant place, and no other person being proposed, the President declared that the period for proposing persons had closed, and directed the ballot to be proceeded with, the names of the persons proposed, in the order in which they were proposed, being—

#### ELLIOTT, R. C. D. ABBOTT, R. H. S.

### Ballot-papers duly certified by the Clerks of the two Houses were issued to honorable members, and

such ballot-papers when filled in were deposited in the ballot-box. At the conclusion of the ballot the scrutincers, with the Clerks of the two Houses, made a scrutiny

of the votes received by each person, and the written report of the scrutineers was handed to the President.

6. RESULT OF BALLOT.—The scrutineers reported that 91 votes were recorded by the honorable members present, and that the result of the ballot was as follows :—

The President thereupon declared that Richard Hartley Smith Abbott, Esquire, having obtained an absolute majority of the votes polled, had been chosen to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the death of Senator David Andrew.

7. NOTIFICATION TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.—The Premier, the Honorable Sir William McPherson, M.L.A., moved—That the President be requested to inform His Excellency the Governor that Richard Hartley Smith Abbott, Esquire, has been chosen to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the death of Senator David Andrew.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

8. VOTE OF THANKS TO THE PRESIDENT.—The Premier, the Honorable Sir William McPherson, M.L.A., moved a vote of thanks to the President, which motion was seconded by the Honorable E. J. Hogan, M.L.A., and carried unanimously.

The President, having returned thanks, declared the Joint Sitting closed.
