

Summary of the Orders – 15 December 2021

Hospitals	Hospitals and care facilities are sensitive settings where vulnerable patients and residents, workers and visitors are at increased risk of being exposed to and transmitting COVID-19.	Visitors permitted for specific circumstances
	Limiting the number of visitors to these settings reduces the number of interactions between a resident or patient and those who may be more mobile in the community, thus reducing opportunities for viral transmission.	 2 visitors at a time, 2 visitors per day (unless visiting for end of life reasons)
		Clarification that persons are not to be excluded where their symptoms are caused by an underlying medical condition or medication.
Care facilities	Care facilities are sensitive settings that require additional public health measures to mitigate the risk to vulnerable residents and to protect the workforce.	5 visitors per resident per day
	Residential aged care facilities have been the location of a significant proportion of outbreaks. Between August and December 2021, outbreaks in residential aged care facilities have still account for 5.5 per cent of all outbreaks in Victoria.
