2. Ms CROZIER (Page no. 9)

... in terms of the mental health impacts and the presentations to our emergency departments, particularly in relation to cannabis use for psychotic episodes with young people? Have you got any data on that? Have the police got any data on that?

Victoria Police Response:

- Victoria Police does not hold data on 'the mental health impacts and presentations to our emergency departments, particularly in relation to cannabis use for psychotic episodes with young people'. We recommend that this query be directed to the Victorian Department of Health.
- However, Victoria Police can provide data on mental health transfer events, noting that caveats and limitations apply as described below.
- Mental health transfers refer to instances where an individual is apprehended under section 351 of the Mental Health Act 2014. This legislation allows for a person to be apprehended if the police officer or protective services officer is satisfied that the person appears to have a mental health issue and, because of the person's apparent mental health issue, the person needs to be apprehended to prevent serious and imminent harm to themselves or to another person, and police arrange for the person to be transferred to a hospital emergency department for a mental health assessment.
- It is important to note that Victoria Police does not code mental health transfers to emergency departments with determining factors such as drug use. This is because Victoria Police members are not clinicians and are not required to exercise any clinical judgement as to whether the person has a mental illness and/or what might be driving the individual's behaviour. Police (and protective services officers) only need to be satisfied that a person appears to be experiencing a mental health issue based on the person's behaviour and appearance and any other relevant information including information from the family and carer if appropriate. Noting this qualification, Table 1 provides the total number of mental health transfers performed each year by Victoria Police over the past six years. Table two provides a breakdown of these transfers by age category. Please refer below.
