This year the department has continued to address the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic while supporting vulnerable people and promoting justice and fairness in Victoria. Our staff, agencies, community organisations and volunteers have continued to serve the Victorian community through hard work and dedication



DJCS Financial Operations

Key financial operations and highlights



Total operating budget of **\$8.95 billion**



Employed **10,000+** staff across DJCS



10 capital projects completed valued at **\$250 million**



15 capital projects commenced valued at \$480 million





Our response to COVID-19

- Ensured continued delivery of justice services to the Victorian community
- Implemented measures in Victorian correctional facilities to protect the health and wellbeing of prisoners and staff and reduce the risk of COVID-19
- Established an on-site COVID-19 vaccination program across all corrections and youth justice facilities
- Supported the health, safety and wellbeing of our employees through tailored mental health and wellbeing supports
- Mobilised state-wide operations to support Victorians to comply with CHO directions
- Established CQV, Victoria's dedicated agency that manages the COVID-19 Accommodation Program
- 38,690 people accommodated in quarantine since 1 December 2020



Supporting our community through the challenges of COVID-19

222,000 Victorians helped with their residential tenancy concerns

94% of matters raised were closed through CAV with an additional **5,853** matters closed through DSCV

73,000 agreements lodged to reduce rent with an average rent decrease of **23%**



Temporary Rental Laws

Emergency rental measures to protect Victorian tenants, landlords and the rental market from the worst impacts of the pandemic were implemented

Temporary law changes ensured the most vulnerable Victorians would not be left homeless



Residential Tenancies Amendments Act 2018 reforms

More than 130 reforms to Victoria's rental laws to create a fairer and safer rental system were made following the cessation of temporary emergency rental protections



Continued activation of the State Control Centre

- Activated for **365 consecutive days** in 2020-21
- Capability uplift in resourcing to support 24/7 coverage including an additional 48 dedicated personnel
- Deployed dedicated emergency personnel to assist emergency relief and response in other States:
 - New South Wales flood disaster -93 multi-agency personnel
 - Western Australia, Tropical Cyclone Seroja -77 personnel

Corrections and Youth Justice

COVID-19 management achievements in 2020-2021



Custody response

Established isolation / protective quarantine period upon reception to custody

Arranged virtual personal visits and remote court appearances

Fast tracked commissioning of new Youth Justice infrastructure



Community response

Implemented a remote case management model for people under community supervision, and maintained face-to-face appointments where appropriate

Expanded home-based community work program for adult offenders

Continued driving activities related to bail, court and parole for young people





Continued focus on Youth Justice diversion

- 1,174 diversions of young people through the Children's Court Youth Diversion Service
- 1,216 young people accessed/were assisted through the Youth Support Service
- **34% reduction** in young people under Youth Justice supervision (2015-16 to 2020-21)
- 42% reduction in the average daily number of Aboriginal children (2016-17 to 2020-21)

Key achievements in 2020-2021



Piloted a *Disability and Complex Needs Service* at the Dame
Phyllis First Centre



Accommodated 74 men at the Maribyrnong Community Residential Facility since its opening



Pre and post release support and reintegration pathways



Outcomes for Aboriginal people

Developed the operating model for the Aboriginal Healing Unit at the Dame Phyllis Frost Centre

Commenced the *Strengthening Aboriginal Healthcare* project:

- Aboriginal Health Risk Review
- Prisoner Health Workshops
- The Torch artwork for Justice Health

Launched the Wulgunggo Ngalu Bush Foods and Nursery Project

Aboriginal Justice Forum

In its 21-year history, the **Aboriginal Justice Forum** was held on-line for the first time with:

- 2 forums successfully held online
- 1 in-person forum held in Horsham

Dja Dja Wurrung

Funding agreement with **Dja Dja Wurrung**

- Property transfer and funding to build the Dja Dja Wurrung Corporate and Community Centre
- The Centre will enhance their ability to make decisions on and care for their country, and self-determine their future





Crime Prevention Strategy

The Victorian Government's Crime Prevention Strategy was released on 21 June 2021.

It sets out how the government will work with the community to prevent crime before it occurs.

It has four key outcomes:



Victorian community are engaged in **local solutions to** prevent crime



Fewer Victorians come into contact with the criminal justice system



More people at risk of offending are **connected to effective** support



Victorians are safer and feel safer
