

Ambulance Victoria's workforce has grown and relative to population, is larger than NSW and the national average.


#### AV workforce 2014-15 to 2021-22

#### **Emergency response**

Paramedics provide clot dissolving medication to treat heart attacks

#### Treat at home

Paramedics connect patients while on scene to the Victorian Virtual ED

After VVED
assessment, around
76% of patients do not
require physical care at
an emergency
department

#### Treat over the phone

Secondary Triage manages almost 20% of Triple Zero callers without an emergency ambulance dispatch
