


Total output funding of \$14 billion in 2023-24 – an increase of almost \$1 billion (7.6%) since 2022-23







The new investment will build:

- 6 new schools to open in 2025
- **3** to open in 2026
- Starting planned and early works for another 3 to open in 2026
- Additional stages at **2** other schools.

There is also a further \$3.6 million for a school at the Royal Children's Hospital.



More investment in upgrading and maintaining schools

for upgrades and improvements, including:

- \$355.8 million for upgrades at 47 schools and \$24 million for 54 schools to begin planning upgrades
- \$10 million to improve learning conditions through the Minor Capital Works Fund
- \$450 million for grants program for better facilities at low-fee Catholic and independent schools

for essential maintenance and compliance including:

- \$217.5 million in additional SRP maintenance funding
- \$103.5 million for the Planned Maintenance Program
- \$10 million for the Accessible Buildings Program
