
Suburban Revitalisation

- Since 2016, the Suburban Revitalisation program has invested more than **\$67 million** into approximately 580 projects with total value of **\$172 million**.
- The program takes a coordinated, place-based approach to economic and community development across Melbourne.

Metropolitan Partnerships

- Partnerships have been conducting targeted engagement activities to better understand how identified priorities are being experienced in place and to trial local, community-led solutions.
- Since establishment in 2017, the Metropolitan Partnerships have engaged with more than 14,000 Melburnians.
- The Metropolitan Partnerships are currently delivering 23 projects that respond to priorities identified by the community and build an evidence base for their advice.

Suburban Development Budget Initiatives 2023-24

Key initiatives in the 2023-24 Budget

Suburban Revitalisation – \$6.2 million:

- Continued support for the Suburban Revitalisation Boards and local revitalisation projects to reinvigorate local activity centres in target suburbs (\$5.2 million in 2023-24).
- Cranbourne Public Hall repair and renovation (\$1.0 million).

Metropolitan Partnerships – \$2.7 million:

- Funding to continue supporting Metropolitan Partnerships, with a renewed focus on outer suburban and disadvantaged communities.
- The Partnerships bring together community, business and government leaders to drive place-based economic and social recovery.

Growing Suburbs Fund – \$10.0 million:

• Funding for grants to Councils to support infrastructure needs in Melbourne's fastest growing suburbs.

Tiny Towns Fund – \$10.0 million (to be delivered in partnership with Regional Development):

• Funding for grants of up to \$50,000 to support infrastructure needs in towns with a population of less than 5,000 in regional Victoria and the outer metropolitan LGAs of Casey, Cardinia, Hume, Melton, Mitchell, Mornington Peninsula, Nillumbik, Whittlesea, Wyndham, and Yarra Ranges.
