





2022



Year 3 students had the highest ever scores in Reading, and were the strongest in the country.



The highest ever proportion of Victorian Year 5 students achieved in the top two bands in Spelling (37.7%).



Victoria saw **significant improvements from 2021 to 2022 in Writing** scores for Year 7 (13.6 pts) and Year 9 (15.5 pts).



Victorian students **improved in 11 of 20 measures** from 2014 to 2022.

2023



Victoria ranked first or second in 16 of 20 measures - more than any other jurisdiction.



Victoria had the smallest, or second smallest proportion of students who need additional support in all 20 domains across Years 3, 5, 7 and 9.



Over 70% of Year 3 and nearly 80% of Year 5 students achieved in the new 'strong' or 'exceeding' proficiency levels for Reading.

NOTE: A new NAPLAN scale was introduced in 2023. Performance in 2023 cannot be compared with previous years.






