Community Interest & Concern

- Very strong community interest and concern regarding the potential for unconventional gas in the Shire
- Several communities have declared themselves 'frack' or 'gasfield' free
- Unconventional gas forums held in the Shire have attracted large numbers of people





Council Position

- Council has made several resolutions on this matter
- Until the impacts are fully understood and can be managed, the State Government should not be authorising unconventional gas development
- In June 2015, Council resolved to oppose the exploration and mining of unconventional gas in the Shire

Our natural landscape of world famous beaches, state and national parks is critical in attracting approx. 2 million visitors annually


Our pristine environment also attracts signature events for the Shire, including:

Incompatible Industry



- Unconventional gas operates on important farmland and landscapes
- Given the importance of such assets in our Shire, we believe the industry is inappropriate for our region and puts at risk key economic growth sectors that generate thousands of jobs.



Environmental Leadership & Renewable Energy

- Council is committed to environmental leadership and will exceed its 30% emissions reduction target 4 – 5 years early
- The current focus on gas perpetuates an outdated energy model
- Council seeks stronger commitments to renewable energy from both the federal and state government
