\$302 million in this Budget to continue the near \$5 billion decade long roll-out of quality, funded Three-


Year-Old Kindergarten to Victorian children

- In 2021, it will be introduced to another 15 LGAs, making 21 in total
- In 2022, children across the whole state will have access to at least five hours of funded Three-Year-Old kindergarten
- By 2029 around 90,000 children each year will benefit from 15 hours per week
