

## Victorian Budget 2020/21

The Andrews Labor Government's 2020-21 State Budget is investing an **\$461.5** million over 4 years in the Disability, Ageing & Carers portfolio.

This will provide assistance for Victorians with a disability, essential services for older Victorians and critical support for carers, bringing to a total new investment of **\$1.3 billion** since the 2015-16 Budget.

This includes:

- **\$241.7 million** for out-of-scope NDIS services, the State Disability Plan & the Disability Worker Regulation Scheme
- **\$219.8 million** for rural and metropolitan residential aged care, clinical placements for aged care safe patient care, addressing social connections across generations and ensuring the response to elder abuse



The Victorian Government contributes **\$2.5 billion** (plus indexation) to the National Disability Insurance Scheme each year.

In the 2020/21 State Budget, an additional **\$1.9 billion** is being invested to support Victorians with a disability, including nearly **\$1.6 billion** to transform support for students with disability in Victorian government schools – doubling the number of students receiving extra support in the classroom to 55,000.



In addition, the Government will fund:

- A \$223.3 million package to provide services outside the scope of the National Disability Insurance Scheme
- A \$11.7 million package to further support the State Disability Plan 2021-2024, including \$7.3 million for autism assessment & diagnosis
- **\$6.7 million** to continue the Disability Worker Regulation Scheme

The Andrews Labor Government will fund a **\$223.3 million** package to provide services outside the scope of the National Disability Insurance Scheme and meet commitments under the National Quality and Safeguarding Framework.

This includes:

- **\$41.9m** to fund the Home and Community Care Program for Younger People (HACC-PYP)
- **\$25m** to continue quality and safeguards for Victorians receiving services
- **\$15.1m** to meet demand for clinical assessments for people seeking to access the NDIS
- **\$13.6m** to support Young people in Residential Aged Care or receiving Home Care Packages
- **\$10.3m** for accommodation for children in state care
- **\$5.1m** to provide continuity of support for former residents of residential institutions
- **\$5.0m** to provide coordination supports for Victorians with complex needs



As part of the *Victorian Budget 2020-21*, the Government is continuing to provide critical asset expenditure to modernise and upgrade Public Sector Residential Aged Care facilities. This includes:

- \$134.6 million TEI for the Public Sector Residential Age Care Services Metropolitan
  Melbourne: <u>Stage 3 Kingston Project</u>
- **\$10 million TEI** for the Rural Residential Aged Care Facilities Renewal Program 2020-21
- \$0.9 million for planning and design of Melbourne Public Sector Residential Aged Care Services Strategy: <u>Stage 4 Coburg Project</u>



## **Ageing and Carers**

The Andrews Labor Government is also providing more than **\$78.9 million** to fund assistance programs and essential services for older Victorians and carers.



This includes:

- \$40 million for a new aged care student placements training program for nurses and personal care workers – if the Commonwealth introduces minimum mandated staffing ratios
- **\$27.6 million** for the future provision of public sector residential aged care to ensure PSRACS meet nursing/resident ratios and continue to deliver the best quality quality care
- **\$6.7 million** to strengthen social connections across generations and to address elder abuse
- **\$4.6 million** to support career pathways into employment for unpaid carers

The Government's COVID-19 inclusion measures to support the portfolio including maintaining social connections and wellbeing for vulnerable cohorts include:

- \$48 million in supports for Victorians with a disability, including \$7.5m to jointly fund the \$15m Disability Mobility Reduction Payment Initiative with the Commonwealth, disability liaison officers in hospitals, the Call-to-test service, support for advocacy and \$2.9m for infection control training for disability service providers
- A **\$9.8 million** Wellbeing Package to further reduce healthcare worker infections and increase access to support, and develop of a healthcare worker wellbeing centre.
- **\$5 million** for the new Community Food Relief Fund, as part of **\$18.7 million** in support for food relief activities across 19/20 and 20/21.
- **\$4.4 million** to continue the Community Activation and Social Isolation (CASI) initiative, bringing the total investment in CASI from the start of the pandemic to \$11.8 Million. The Seniors festival was expanded and included radio programs.
- **\$0.8 million** for the *weVolunteer* portal
- **\$50 million** to for maintenance and upgrades of PSRACS and state-owned Specialist Disability Accommodation as part of the COVID economic recovery package

Consultation for a **new State Disability Plan** recommenced on December 3 2020, *International Day of People with Disability*, after pausing due to COVID-19.
