



Victorian Skills Authority

An even better TAFE and training system

\$85.9 million



to establish the Victorian Skills Authority and be more responsive to the needs of our economy

The new Authority brings together the Victorian Skills Commissioner, Skills and Job Centres, and the VET Development Centre, and will work with industry, providers, and stakeholders to:

- use data analysis and insights to better plan for the future training needs of Victoria's economy
- generate place-based solutions for local and statewide problems
- support improvements in the quality of training
- drive collaborative innovation across the VET sector.



Office of TAFE Coordination and Delivery (OTCD)

\$7 million



to support the Office of TAFE Coordination and Delivery

- to drive collaboration and coordination across the TAFE network
- coordinate public provider strategy, asset strategy, workforce strategy, shared services, governance, performance and accountability and oversight of TAFE finances
- expected to be implemented as a new business unit with the Department of Education and Training from mid-2021.
