## Minutes of the Proceedings

OF THE

### LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

#### TUESDAY, 15TH FEBRUARY, 1870.

Pursuant to Proclamation the Council met.

At Two o'clock the Clerk of the Council read the Proclamation convening the Parliament :-

#### Proclamation

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Henry Thomas Viscount Canterbury, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and Baron Bottesford, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

Whereas, by The Constitution Act, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria and, subject to the limitation therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he may think fit; and also from time to time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he shall deem it expedient: And whereas the said Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly, called "The Parliament of Victoria," now stand prorogued until Friday, the twenty-eighth day of January instant, and it is expedient to fix the time for holding the next Session thereof: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, do by this my Proclamation further prorogue the said Parliament of Victoria from Friday, the twenty-eighth day of January instant, until Tuesday, the fifteenth day of February aforesaid, as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session of the said Council and Assembly, called the "Parliament of Victoria," for the despatch of business, at Two of the clock in the afternoon, in the Parliament Houses, situate in Parliament place, Spring street, in the City of Melbourne; and the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-fifth day of January, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in the thirty-third year of Her Majesty's reign.

#### GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

APPROACH OF THE GOVERNOR.—The approach of His Excellency the Governor was announced by the Usher.

His Excellency the Governor came into the Council Chamber, and commanded the Usher to desire the attendance of the Legislative Assembly in the Council Chamber, who being come with their Speaker, His Excellency was pleased to speak as follows:—

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

The financial requirements of the Public Service have rendered it necessary for me to call you together after an unusually short recess.

Regulations under the Land Act 1869 have been carefully prepared, under which it is confidently hoped the widest possible facilities will be afforded for the settlement of the country.

The Southern Cross has been adopted and inaugurated as the distinguishing device of this

Colony.

It is gratifying to know that the reduction in Telegraphic Charges has conferred great advantage on the community, and has led to a large increase in the number of messages.

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

The Estimates which will be submitted to you, while framed with due regard to economy, make large provision for public works, the construction of which cannot be further delayed without serious inconvenience.

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Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

The tenders for the Mail Service and the conveyance of passengers via the Cape of Good Hope have been fully considered by my Advisers, but they are unable to recommend the acceptance of any of them.

New Immigration Regulations have been prepared and will be laid before you, which will,  ${
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trust, secure a regular and well-selected addition to our population.

A Bill for the amendment of the Electoral Act will be submitted to you for the purpose of effecting a more satisfactory adjustment of the boundaries of electoral districts.

A Bill will be submitted to you for establishing Courts for the settlement of disputes about land.

You will be asked to consider measures to provide for Mining on Private Property on an

equitable basis, and for better regulating the drainage of quartz reefs.

A Bill will also be laid before you for the purpose of providing for the inspection of mines, intended to secure greater precaution in mining operations, and thus prevent the frequent occurrence of serious and fatal accidents.

A Bill to give to workmen a lien over the work executed by them, and a Bill regulating the number of hours of labor to be exacted from young persons employed in factories, will be submitted

A Bill will be introduced, based upon the Act recently passed in the Imperial Parliament, for

dealing more effectually with the estates of Insolvent debtors.

The existing condition of the works in connection with water supply to Castlemaine and Sandhurst, and the larger question of providing for the requirements of other populous districts, have been anxiously considered by my Advisers, and I entertain the hope that during the present Session a measure may be submitted to you for speedily utilizing the works in course of construction, and for the gradual extension of similar benefits to other districts.

The necessary steps for commencing the construction of the North-Eastern Railway have been taken: tenders for the earthworks have been called for; the Agent-General has been instructed, after consultation with certain eminent engineers, to invite tenders for the materials for the permanent way and the construction of passenger and goods engines. I hope and believe that when these tenders are received it will be apparent that further Railway works can be undertaken for the benefit of other districts without injuriously disturbing the credit of the Colony or imposing an unreasonable burden on its revenues.

The approaching withdrawal of the Imperial troops suggests for your consideration the establishment of a local military force, whose services, in addition to their ordinary duties, might be available for guarding prisoners employed in the construction of public works, such as breakwaters and dredging operations, which would not otherwise be undertaken.

A Bill to establish a Marine Board, whereby the duties hitherto discharged by the department of Ports and Harbors, the Pilot Board, and the Steam Navigation Board will be consolidated, has

been prepared for your consideration.

You will be invited to consider the questions of impounding and fencing, and the amendment of the law for the prevention of diseases in animals.

You will also be invited to consider a Bill containing provisions for punishing more effectually a certain class of criminals, including those guilty of offences against women and children. A Bill to provide for the regulation and management of the Police Force will be submitted

The question of Education has engaged the anxious deliberation of my Advisers, and they will be prepared to submit for your consideration a measure providing for the greater efficiency of the Public Schools and a more general and regular attendance thereat.

It is intended to submit for your approval a Bill for the Abolition of State Aid to

I congratulate you on the flourishing condition of the country, and I earnestly hope that your deliberations, by the blessing of Divine Providence, will advance the prosperity and happiness of the people.

WHEREAS, by the Bill contained in the Schedule to a Statute passed in the Session of Our Imperial Parliament, holden in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Our Reign, intituled "An Act to enable "Her Majesty to assent to a Bill as amended of the Legislature of Victoria to establish a Con"stitution in and for the Colony of Victoria," it is enacted that no Member, either of the Legislative
Council or of the Legislative Assembly, shall be permitted to sit or vote therein respectively until he shall have taken and subscribed before the Governor, or before some person authorized by the Governor in that behalf, the oath in the said Bill mentioned: WE DO THEREFORE by these presents command and authorize you from time to time, in the Parliament House, in the City of Melbourne, to administer the said oath to such Members of the said Legislative Council as have not already taken and subscribed the same. In TESTIMONY whereof, we have caused the Seal of our said Colony to be hereunto affixed.

#### MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

We, Her Most Gracious Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Members of the Legislative Council of Victoria, in Parliament assembled, beg leave to approach Your Excellency with renewed expressions of our loyalty and attachment to Her Majesty's throne and person.

We desire to thank Your Excellency for having called us together to consider the financial

requirements of the public service.

We are glad to learn that Regulations under *The Land Act* 1869, have been prepared, under which it is confidently hoped the widest possible facilities will be afforded for the settlement of the

It gives us satisfaction to know that, in concert with the Imperial Government, the Southern Cross blended with the Union Jack has been adopted as the distinguishing device of this colony; a symbol of that perpetual union which we hope will ever connect the inhabitants of this colony with the parent state.

We hear with much pleasure that the reduction in Telegraphic charges has been found to confer great advantage on the community, and that it has led to a large increase in the number of

messages.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that the tenders for the Mail Service and the conveyance of passengers viâ the Cape of Good Hope have been fully considered by your advisers, but we regret to learn that on a subject of such vital importance no definite results have been attained.

We are glad to know that new Immigration Regulations have been prepared, and will be laid before us, and we concur with Your Excellency in the hope that they will secure a regular and well selected addition to our population—a matter, the importance of which cannot be over estimated, and

in respect of which we regret that there has been so much delay.

Bills relating to State aid to Religion, to the Electoral Act, and to kindred subjects affecting the Constitution, being of a fundamental nature, should, in our opinion, be considered in the first instance by Joint Committees of both Houses, in order that an equitable and satisfactory result may be obtained; and we cannot refrain from pointing out to Your Excellency that, in order to obtain such a result and secure the harmonious working of the Legislature in all its branches, the Constitution Act contemplates the inclusion, amongst Your Excellency's responsible advisers, of Members of both Houses, a requirement which has been unhappily overlooked, both now and in time past, to the great detriment of the interests of the community.

To the Bill for establishing Courts for the Settlement of Disputes about Land; to the measures to provide for Mining on Private Property on an equitable basis, and for the better regulating of the Drainage of Quartz Reefs; to the Bill for the purpose of providing for the Inspection of Mines, intended to secure greater precautions in mining operations, and to prevent the frequent occurrence of serious and fatal accidents; and to the Bills to give to Workmen a Lien over the Work executed by them, and for regulating the number of Hours of Labor of Young Persons employed in Factories; and to the Bill to be introduced, based upon the Act recently passed by the Imperial Parliament, by which the estates of Insolvent Debtors may be more effectually dealt with, we shall devote our earnest consideration.

The subjects of Water Supply and Railway Extension, when brought before us, shall also

receive our most earnest consideration.

We regret to be informed that it is intended to remove the Imperial troops, and thus to

necessitate the consideration of the question of establishing a local military force.

Our attention will be cheerfully given to the Bill to establish a Marine Board, whereby the duties hitherto discharged by the Department of Ports and Harbors, the Pilot Board, and the Steam Navigation Board will be discharged by the same board; also to the questions of Impounding and Fencing, and to any amendment that may be proposed in the law for the prevention of Diseases in Animals.

We shall be prepared to consider the Bill containing provisions for punishing more effectually a certain class of criminals and persons guilty of offences against Women and Children; and like-

wise the Bill to provide for the regulation and management of the Police Force.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that the question of Education has engaged the anxious deliberation of Your Excellency's advisers, and we shall be prepared to give our best consideration to any measure dealing with so momentous a subject.

We join in Your Excellency's congratulations on the flourishing condition of the country, and in the earnest hope that our deliberations, by the blessing of Divine Providence, will advance the prosperity and happiness of the people.

# Minutes of the Proceedings

### LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

#### FRIDAY, 15TH JULY, 1870.

The Clerk of the Council having stated that the President was unavoidably detained, the Chairman of Committees took the Chair as Deputy President.

The Deputy President read the Prayer.

PRINTING COMMITTEE. - SECOND REPORT. - The Honorable J. Graham brought up the Second Report of the Printing Committee, and moved, That the Report be received, adopted, and printed. Question—put and passed.

APPROACH OF HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR .- The approach of His Excellency the Governor was announced by the Usher.

ROYAL ASSENT TO BILLS, AND RESERVATION OF A BILL FOR THE SIGNIFICATION OF HER MAJESTY'S PLEASURE.—His Excellency the Governor came into the Council Chamber and commanded the Usher to desire the attendance of the Legislative Assembly in the Council Chamber; who being come with their Speaker, he, after a short speech to His Excellency, delivered the Appropriation Bill to the Clerk, who brought it to the table.

His Excellency was then pleased to assent, in the name of Her Majesty the Queen, to the following Bills:

"An Act to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the services of the year One "thousand eight hundred and seventy and to appropriate the Supplies granted in this "Session of Parliament and for other purposes."

"An Act to sanction the issue and application of certain sums of money from 'The Railway

" Loan Account' for Salaries Wages and Contingencies for the service of the year One "thousand eight hundred and seventy."

"An Act for taking an account of the Population and of the Live Stock in the year One "thousand eight hundred and seventy-one."

" An Act for the prevention of the Scab in Sheep."

"An Act to authorize the raising of Money for Public Works and other purposes."
"An Act to amend the Mining Companies Limited Liability Act 1864."

"An Act to amend an Act intituled 'An Act to amend and consolidate the Laws relating to " ' Municipal Corporations.'"

" An Act to extend the powers of the Acting Inspector-General of Public Works."

"An Act for amending 'The Waterworks Commissioners Act 1869."

"An Act to sanction the issue and expenditure of certain sums from 'The Public Works Loan "Account' for Salaries Wages and Contingencies for the service of the year One "thousand eight hundred and seventy."

The Royal Assent being read severally by the Clerk of the Parliaments in the following words:-

"In the name and on behalf of Her Majesty I assent to this Act.

"CANTERBURY, " Governor."

His Excellency was then pleased to reserve for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon the following Bill, viz. :- "A Bill intituled 'An Act to provide for the Abolition of State Aid to " 'Religion.'"

The Clerk of the Parliaments delivered to Mr. Speaker Schedules of the Bills assented to, and of the Bill reserved.

His Excellency was then pleased to speak as follows:-

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

I am happy to be enabled to release you for the present from further attendance in Parliament. Although the Session has not been marked by much important legislation, several measures of

practical utility, which I need not enumerate, have passed into law.

I have to congratulate you on the settlement of the long-vexed question of the abolition of State Aid to Religion. If in effecting that settlement mutual concessions have been made, much has been gained thereby; and I trust that the zeal of the religious bodies, increased, as no doubt it will be, by the conviction of the necessity of complete self-reliance, will more than compensate for the loss of the grant from the State which they have been accustomed to receive.

I have, in accordance with the Constitution Statute, reserved this measure for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon.

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

I thank you on behalf of Her Majesty for the liberality with which you have granted Supplies for the requirements of the Public Service.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

An essential of all practical and satisfactory legislation is, that it be preceded by due enquiry and deliberation; it is therefore my intention, in accordance with the recommendation of my Advisers, to issue Royal Commissions to enquire into the state of the Public Service, the working of our Charitable Institutions, and into the condition and management of the Penal Establishments, with a view of utilizing convict labor; also into the important subjects of Federation and Intercolonial Legislation, which have already been partially dealt with by Committees of the Legislative Assembly.

My Advisers are deeply impressed with the necessity for removing all undue restrictions upon mining enterprise, and their earnest attention will be devoted to this subject during the recess.

An immediate and rigid investigation will be made into the state of the works for Water Supply, and my Advisers will have under their consideration a scheme for the extension and completion of such works by local bodies assisted by Government.

The works on the first four sections of the Railway to the Upper Murray are being prosecuted with vigour, and you will be glad to hear that tenders will speedily be invited for a further portion of this important undertaking. Orders are also in course of execution for rolling-stock, and it is intended to complete this undertaking with the least possible delay.

The Government will take such steps as may be necessary in order to give effect to the

resolutions agreed to at the recent Intercolonial Conference.

You will have learned from the papers which have been presented to you that Her Majesty's Imperial Government have determined upon the withdrawal, at an early date, of the troops now stationed in the Australian Colonies. My Advisers will give their attention to the question of our defences in connection with the organization of a local force.

It is the desire of the Government that the recess shall be as brief as is consistent with the due preparation of the measures to be submitted for your consideration in the ensuing session, and especially that the Estimates for the requirements of the public service after the expiration of the present year may be laid before you as early as possible.

I now, in Her Majesty's name, declare this Parliament to be prorogued to Thursday, the first

day of September next, and it is hereby prorogued accordingly.

### GREAT MELBOURNE TELESCOPE.

LAID UPON THE TABLE BY THE HONORABLE R. S. ANDERSON, AND ORDERED BY THE COUNCIL TO BE PRINTED, 23RD MARCH, 1870.

#### GREAT MELBOURNE TELESCOPE—REPORT ON—BY GOVERNMENT ASTRONOMER.

SIR,

Observatory, 31st December, 1869.

I have the honor to submit for your information a report of the erection and subsequent working of the Great Melbourne Telescope. The telescope arrived in November, 1868, and its erection at the Observatory was commenced early in January of the present year. The building for its protection was not completed till June, and the final fitting up of the telescope finished early in July.

From a report furnished by Mr. Le Sueur, the astronomer in charge, I extract the following:-"Observations were attempted as early as April in this year, but the telescope was not in fair working order till about the middle of August, since which date observation has progressed more or less satisfactorily.

"The principal work has consisted in examination and mapping out of nebulæ; but the very unfavorable weather throughout almost the whole season has prevented much progress. Of other work, position observations have been made of Winnecke's periodical comet. Except in so far that largeness of aperture may permit the following up of a comet to a late date, the great telescope is, of course, unsuited for that kind of work, and bad weather at the critical time prevented a full utilization of the above-mentioned peculiarity; yet it is thought that the later observations may be of value in filling in the series which will have been obtained in Europe.

"When favorably situated, Neptune was observed on many occasions for examination of figure and

detection of new satellite, with negative results in both cases."

With respect to spectroscopic observations, Mr. Le Sueur says:-"The spectroscope furnished by Mr. Grubb has already proved of much service for nebulæ work; for star work, so far as I can at present judge, it is unsuitable; nevertheless, a very important observation has lately been made therewith, showing that the spectrum of the variable  $\eta$  Argo is crossed with bright lines. To follow up this and star observation generally, to much purpose, would require a considerably modified spectroscope. The one now

on hand was intended specially for nebulæ work, and for this it is as competent as could be desired."

Nothing has as yet been done in celestial photography. It was supposed that the original vote would have been sufficient to cover the expense of a suitable photographic apparatus; but the many extra expenses incidental to packing, shipment, &c., exhausted the available funds. The Royal Society of London, however, deeming it of great importance that the telescope should be fitted for photographic work, kindly took it upon themselves to order the requisite appliances, which, I believe, are now in course of construction by Mr. Grubb, the maker of the telescope. We are not yet informed of the exact cost of the

apparatus, but it will be necessary to relieve the Royal Society of its self-imposed burden.

In my report to the Board of Visitors in April last, I referred to the construction of the telescope, but could not, at that time, speak of its performance or capabilities; but during the several months' use since then Mr. Le Sueur has tested its performance most carefully; and, although I have had no prior experience with reflecting telescopes of such dimensions as this, I have been enabled, from frequent

observations, to form a sound opinion of its powers.

With the large mirror first used, the telescope certainly did not perform so satisfactorily as could be desired, and, making all allowances for atmospheric disturbances, the definition was never good; but with the other mirror (supposed B) it became very much better, and Mr. Le Sueur speaks of its performance now as far more satisfactory. The large mirror first in use has become very dull, from a peculiar kind of yellow tarnish; and it is highly probable that it will have to be re-polished before it is fit for much service; and, considering the great delicacy of the operation, and necessity of considerable experience in its performance, it will be advisable to obtain a supplementary metal mirror of 12 or 15 inches diameter, which should be figured and polished, not only for the practice of the astronomer in charge of the telescope, but also for the training of the assisting workmen.

The building for the protection of the telescope is, in most respects, satisfactory. The peculiar construction of the roof renders the exclusion of dust a difficult matter, but much, I believe, can yet be done to improve it on this score. The rolling gear, by means of which the roof is traversed from over the telescope, was somewhat defective at first, but has since been made to work satisfactorily. The polishing apparatus, with its driving steam-engine, are in their places, and ready for use whenever they may be required.

The necessary stages for testing the mirrors when on the polishing machine are now in course of erection. A photographic room has been erected in the telescope room, and will be ready for use in a few weeks.

There are several arrangements and appliances yet required before the telescope can be said to be properly provided; among which are more convenient observing seats, drawing stands, and the erection of a platform outside the telescope room for photographic operation. Some of these are already in progress, and, should sufficient means be available, will soon be completed.

### Draft of Proposed Fencing Act Amendment Bill, 1870.

1. Title of Act, and repeal of former Acts.

2. From and after the coming into operation of this Act, the owner owners of lands may of lands adjoining or abutting upon any other lands, and having no sufficient dividing fence may require by writing under his hand in the form set forth in Schedule I to this Act, the owner or person legally possessed of and holding any adjoining land (except such lands as may be held under the Crown by temporary occupation only) or his agent to assist in equal proportions to make any or all the dividing fences between such lands respectively, and in case the owner of such adjoining lands or person legally possessed of and holding the same, or his agent, shall refuse or neglect to assist or fail to use due diligence in making such dividing fences for the space of three months after receiving such requisition, the owner of such adjoining lands who shall have made such requisition and who shall have completed his share of such fencing, may engage and contract with any person to erect and complete such dividing fence or fences, or so much thereof as shall not then be completed, and the person authorised to make such dividing fences, or the person with whom he shall so contract, may procure and purchase the materials necessary for the erecting and completing of such fencing, and all sums of money which shall or may be so expended or laid out under the provisions of this section, shall be recoverable before any Court of Petty Sessions as money paid to the use of the person so neglecting or

refusing as aforesaid. 3. Should the owners of such adjoining or abutting lands disagree Arbitration in case as to the portions of fencing which each shall erect complete or repair, the dispute shall be decided by the arbitration of two persons to be chosen by such owners. Provided that in case such arbitrators shall not agree within the space of one month next after such reference shall have been made to them, then the question shall be referred to the determination of such impartial person as the said arbitrators, by writing under their hands, shall nominate and appoint as umpire, and the decision of such umpire shall be conclusive. Provided, also, that in case either of the parties disagreeing shall neglect or refuse for the space of one month after notice in writing given by the other party for that purpose, to appoint an arbitrator as aforesaid, the arbitrator chosen by the party giving such notice may make an award ex parte which shall be binding and conclusive in like manner as if the party so neglecting or refusing had chosen an arbitrator who had actually found and made an award

The owners of such adjoining or abutting lands shall maintain and keep in repair such dividing fences or such portions of them as they shall mutually agree upon or as shall be decided by arbitration in terms of the preceding section, and if either of such owners shall discover any portion of a dividing fence in want of repair not being the portion which he himself is bound to keep in repair he may give written notice to the owner, who is bound to keep it in repair, to do so. within twenty-four hours the owner on whom such notice has been served shall not properly repair such fence, the owner giving such notice shall have power to repair such fence and to recover the costs of so repairing it as money paid to the use of the owner on whom such notice shall have been served.

[Provision should be made in this clause for more extensive repairs than a simple breakage.

Persons who shall enclose their lands before the lands adjoining been granted shall be authorised to recover from any future proprietor one-half of the dividing fence.

5. If any person or persons shall after the coming into operation of this Act enclose his lands before the lands immediately adjoining shall have been duly granted by the Crown or otherwise held as private property, the owner of land so enclosed shall be authorised to claim and recover from the person who shall afterwards become the proprietor of such adjoining lands one-half of the actual value of the wall hedge or actual value of the fence forming the dividing line or fence between the said adjoining lands; and such value shall be ascertained immediately or as soon as may be after such adjoining land shall have been granted by the Crown or otherwise held as private property as aforesaid by the arbitration of two persons to be chosen by the parties; and the amount which shall be awarded under such arbitration as one-half of the value of such dividing fence shall be recoverable by due course of law, if not paid within twelve months after the date of the award. Provided that in case such two persons so chosen as aforesaid shall not agree in the amount to be paid for one-half of the value of such dividing fence within the space of one month next after such reference shall be made to them, then the question shall be referred to the determination of such indifferent person as the said arbitrators by writing under their hands shall nominate and appoint as umpire; and the decision of such umpire Provided also that in case either of the parties in shall be conclusive. difference shall neglect or refuse for the space of one month after notice in writing given by the other party for that purpose to appoint an arbitrator as aforesaid, the arbitrator to be chosen by the party giving such notice may make an award ex parte, which shall be binding and conclusive in like manner as if the party so neglecting or refusing had chosen an arbitrator who had actually joined and made an award therein.

Every agreement and every such order as aforesaid to erect a dividing fence shall as to the lands respectively to which such agreement or order relates have equal force and effect against every and any subsequent owner thereof so as to render every such owner liable to erect or (as the case may be) to uphold and keep in repair at all times the dividing fence or fences which the owner originally affected by such agreement or order was thereby made liable to erect or repair in respect of such land; and if at any time the dividing fence which the owner of such land for the time being shall be liable to erect or repair as aforesaid shall not be well and sufficiently erected or repaired such owner shall be answerable in damages for any injury thereby occasioned to the adjoining owner but no such owner shall be entitled to claim damages or to have any redress by law for or in respect of any loss or alleged injury which such neglect shall occasion or may at any time have occasioned to himself.
