WEDNESDAY, 6TH JULY, 1927.

1. The Council met pursuant to the Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of June, 1927, which Proclamation was read by the Clerk and is as follows:—

FIXING THE TIME FOR HOLDING THE FIRST SESSION OF THE TWENTY-NINTH PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Lieutenant-Colonel the Right Honorable Arthur Herbert Tennyson, Baron Somers, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Companion of the Distinguished Service Order, Military Cross; Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, do by this my Proclamation, fix Wednesday, the sixth day of July, 1927, as the time for the commencement and holding of the First Session of the Twenty-ninth Parliament of Victoria, for the despatch of business, at the hour of half-past Ten o'clock in the forenoon, in the Parliament Houses, situate in Spring-street in the City of Melbourne: And the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria aforesaid, at Melbourne, this twenty-eighth day of June, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven, and in the eighteenth year of the reign of His Majesty King George V.

GOD SAVE THE KING!

The Honorable Mr. Justice Cussen, the Commissioner from His Excellency the Governor appointed to open the Parliament, having been introduced to the Council Chamber by the Usher, His Honour desired the Usher to request the presence of the Members of the Legislative Assembly to hear read the Letters Patent for the commencement and holding of this present Session of the Parliament.

The Members of the Legislative Assembly having presented themselves, His Honour Mr. Justice Cussen said:—

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

His Excellency the Governor, not thinking fit to be present in person, has been pleased to cause Letters Patent to issue, under the seal of the State, constituting me his Commissioner, to do in his name all that is necessary to be performed in this Parliament. This will more fully appear from the Letters Patent which will now be read by the Clerk.

Then the said Letters Patent were read by the Clerk as follows, viz.:-

GEORGE, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India:

Whereas by Proclamation made the twenty-eighth day of June by His Excellency Lieutenant-Colonel the Right Honorable ARTHUR HERBERT TENNYSON, BARON SOMERS, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Companion of the Distinguished Service Order, Military Cross, Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, Wednesday, the sixth day of July, was fixed as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session of the Parliament of Victoria, at half-past Ten of the clock in the forenoon, in the Parliament Houses, situate in the City of Melbourne: And forasmuch as for certain causes the said ARTHUR HERBERT TENNYSON, BARON SOMERS, cannot conveniently be present in person in the said Parliament at that time: Now know ye that We, trusting in the discretion, fidelity, and care of Our trusty and well-beloved The Honorable Sir Leo Finn Bernard Cussen, Knight, Judge of Our Supreme Court of Victoria, do give and grant by the tenor of these presents unto you the said Leo Finn Bernard Cussen full power in Our name to begin and hold the said Session of Our said Parliament, and to do everything which for and by Us, or the said ARTHUR HERBERT TENNYSON, BARON SOMERS, shall be there to be done; commanding also by the tenor of these presents all whom it may concern to meet our said Parliament, and to the said Leo Finn Bernard Cussen that he diligently attend in the premises and form aforesaid. In testimony whereof We have caused the Seal of Our said State to be hereunto affixed.

Witness Our trusty and well-beloved Lieutenant-Colonel the Right Honorable Arthur Herbert Tennyson, Baron Somers, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Companion of the Distinguished Service Order, Military Cross, Governor of the said State and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c., at Melbourne, this second day of July, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven, and in the eighteenth year of the reign of His Majesty King George V.

Then the Honorable Mr. Justice Cussen said —

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I have it in command from His Excellency to let you know that, later this day, His Excellency will declare to you in person, in this place, the cause of his calling this Parliament together; and, Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly, as it is necessary before you proceed to the despatch of business that a Speaker of the Legislative Assembly be chosen, His Excellency requests that you, in your Chamber, will proceed to the choice of a proper person to be Speaker.

The Members of the Legislative Assembly then withdrew.

The Commissioner withdrew.

- 2. The President took the Chair and read the Prayer.

4. APPROACH OF HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.—The approach of His Excellency the Governor was announced by the Usher.

His Excellency came into the Council Chamber, and commanded the Usher to desire the immediate attendance of the Legislative Assembly, who, being come with their Speaker, His Excellency was pleased to speak as follows:—

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I have summoned you to meet for the consideration of important public business that will be submitted for your earnest attention.

The visit of Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York to Australia in connexion with the inauguration of the meetings of the Parliament of the Commonwealth at Canberra was an event of historical importance which will ever live in the memory of Australians.

The establishment of the Seat of Government for the Commonwealth at the capital city of Australia has enabled the Parliament of Victoria to return to this building, which it occupied prior to the inauguration of Federation.

Before closing their sittings in Melbourne, the Senate and the House of Representatives unanimously passed the following resolution:—

"That the Parliament of the Commonwealth expresses to the Parliament, the Government, and the people of Victoria, its grateful thanks for their generous hospitality in placing the Parliament House of the State of Victoria at the disposal of the Parliament of the Commonwealth."

In addition, a Commonwealth Act to provide for the erection of a memorial in connexion with the occupation by the Commonwealth Parliament of the Parliament House of the State of Victoria made available a sum of £50,000 for that purpose.

My Advisers will take an early opportunity of considering what will be the best method of utilizing this money so as to commemorate appropriately the occupation of this building by the Commonwealth Parliament.

The Government, immediately on assuming office, was faced with the task of dealing with unemployment. An earnest attempt has been made to relieve the position by putting in hand a number of works of a reproductive nature in various parts of the State. Municipalities are being invited to assist the Government in providing employment, and provision will be made for payments to municipalities for that purpose on a pound for pound basis.

for payments to municipalities for that purpose on a pound for pound basis.

The Conference of Commonwealth and State Ministers held last month to discuss the financial relations of the Commonwealth and the States was of great importance. Following the abolition by the Commonwealth Parliament of the per capita grants, certain proposals were submitted by the Prime Minister for the consideration of the States. The proposals, as amended, will form the basis of discussion at a further conference to be held in Sydney this month. Whatever agreement is arrived at will be placed before you for your consideration.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

A measure to make preliminary provision for the services of the current financial year will be laid before you almost immediately; and Supplementary Estimates of Expenditure for the year 1926–27 will be submitted in due course.

The Government views with deep concern the present financial position of the State. For the past two years the expenditure has greatly exceeded the revenue, and My Advisers feel that this drift must be arrested. The methods to be adopted in order to place the finances of the State on a satisfactory basis are receiving their very close attention.

The Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the current financial year, which are now in course of preparation, will be submitted for your consideration at the earliest practicable moment.

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

The Government recognizes that there are many matters of supreme importance affecting the future welfare of the State awaiting attention.

Legislation will be introduced for the establishment of a Rural Bank to assist primary producers.

A Bill will be placed before you at an early date to provide for the construction of a bridge over the River Yarra at Spencer-street.

A measure will be introduced for the establishment of a Greater Melbourne Council, which will absorb the City of Melbourne, as well as other municipalities and certain public Authorities within the metropolis.

Proposals for giving effect to the recommendations of the Royal Commission on Outer Ports will be submitted for your consideration.

In accordance with what My Advisers consider was the policy approved by the country at the last general elections, a measure to revise the Electoral Districts Act passed last session will be brought forward at the earliest practicable stage during the present Parliament.

In order to improve and stabilize conditions in the dairying industry, the work of Herd Testing Associations will be extended and consideration given to the question of certifying and branding cows which are submitted to Herd Testing Associations for testing. My Advisers will

institute a scheme whereby pedigree cattle will be acquired by the Department of Agriculture and made available to dairy farmers on reasonable terms in order to enable them to improve their herds.

The Government realizes the urgent necessity for a pure milk supply, and believes that the dairy farmer should obtain an adequate return for the products of his farm. Bills will be introduced to promote these objects.

It is proposed to extend the operation of the Cattle Compensation Acts so as to include

swine.

To give effect to proposals to secure law reform, Bills to amend the law relating to county courts, justices, and marriage will be laid before you; also a Bill to make further provision for

legal aid to poor persons.

In furtherance of the principle of free education, the Government has abolished the payment of fees by students at Junior Technical Schools; and, to promote attendance of students at Senior Technical Schools, a scheme of scholarships will be inaugurated open to all students attending approved Junior Technical Schools.

Amongst the many questions receiving the consideration of My Advisers are the following:—Discharged soldiers' settlement, housing, hospital accommodation, provision for mental defectives, labour bureaux, rates of interest charged by money-lenders, and the further development

of the State's coal deposits.

The Government has re-introduced the practice of issuing return tickets on the railways and taken action to retain the eleven-ton trucks.

My Advisers have instructed all Public Departments to promote the use of Australian-made goods.

In addition to other measures, Bills dealing with the following subjects will be submitted to you:---

Highways and Vehicles;
Motor Omnibuses;
Health;
Absentee Voting;
Factories and Shops;
Real Estate and Business Agents;
Forests;
Local Government;
Weights and Measures;
Apprenticeship;
Public Service Board;
Footscray New Road.

I trust that, under the blessing of Divine Providence, your deliberations will conduce to the welfare of the people and the prosperity of the State.

Which being concluded, a copy of the Speech was delivered to the President, and a copy to Mr. Speaker, and His Excellency the Governor left the Chamber.

The Deputy-President said-

Before putting the motion, I should like to add my testimony to what has been said by honorable members regarding one of our great citizens. Sir John McWhae possessed all the best characteristics of the Scotchman. The manner in which he won his way to the highest position has set an admirable example to young Australia. He gained a leading position in public life by dogged perseverance. His influence strengthened all that was best in our social, political, and national life. I think that it is a fitting act for us to place on record the motion that has been moved by the Minister of Public Works. It is a grand thing that men earn such praise as Sir John McWhae has deservedly received. He left an example that the young men of our land may well follow. He was a man of strong principles and of great personality. He stood loyally at all times for noble conceptions of character that made for the advancement of the State. I found him always a true friend. We know the wonderful work that he did during the war, and how liberally he stood by the broken boys from the front. He has left a record that will be preserved not only in the archives of Victoria, but also in the hearts and memories of numberless families. It is a profound sorrow that Sir John McWhae should have died away from home. It is also sad that Lady McWhae had to undertake the long return journey to

Victoria without her husband's companionship. There is a conviction that he has passed to a higher service, but his ideals and influence must live and encourage the young manhood of the State to catch his spirit and to emulate his high sense of duty. When I was in London I had an opportunity of witnessing his work and of learning the power he exercised as Agent-General for this State. I learnt how men listened to his advice regarding Australian affairs, and how he endeavoured to induce the right class of migrant to come to this land. He has left an example that will remain and will influence a large section of the community. I join in the sincere regrets expressed by honorable members, and pray that God may comfort Lady McWhae and the family in their great sorrow. I trust that they will experience a sympathy that will comfort them in their hours of trial.

The President said-

In answer to the honorable member's question, which he advised me he intended to ask, I desire to say it is not a desirable practice that the President should give rulings on hypothetical cases, or on the conduct of affairs in Committee before they occur, because, in the latter case, it is the Chairman of Committee's prerogative to give a ruling in the first instance, and for members to have, with the consent of the Chairman, an appeal to the President. In regard to Mr. Tuckett's question,

I therefore answer that it is not for me at this stage to say what may or may not be admitted in Committee. I should, however, advise the House what action may be taken by it before the Bill gets into Committee. Standing Order 274 provides that—

"Any amendment may be made to a clause, provided the same be relevant to the subjectmatter of the Bill, or pursuant to an instruction"

May, at page 399 of the 13th edition of his Parliamentary Practice, states that an instruction empowers the Committee on a Bill—

"To perfect and complete the legislation defined by the contents of the Bill, or extend the provisions of the Bill to cognate objects."

Standing Order 215 provides that—

"Notice shall be required of an instruction, and the time for moving an instruction to a Committee is when the Council is about to first resolve itself into such Committee, before the President leaves the chair."

If the honorable member fears that a proposed amendment will not be accepted by the Chairman in Committee, he can, therefore, immediately after the committal of the Bill, move, by leave, that it be an instruction to the Committee that they have power to consider an amendment or a new clause relating to the control of timber on roads. If leave is refused by any one member, the mover may give notice of his intention to move for an instruction on the next day of meeting. The Minister in charge of the Bill, if he desires to facilitate the moving of the proposed instruction, could move that the committal of the Bill be postponed until the next day of meeting, and so allow the honorable member's notice of motion for an instruction to be first decided. If, on the other hand, the Minister does not desire to facilitate the instruction the honorable member himself may, as an amendment to the question, "That the President do now leave the chair," move, "That the Council will to-morrow resolve itself into the said Committee." I should add that, while an instruction of the House to the Committee widens somewhat the definition of what is relevant, the subject-matter of an instruction must still be relevant to the Bill. According to the practice of Parliament, it would be the President's duty to refuse to accept a motion for an instruction to consider an amendment that is entirely irrelevant to the Bill. If an instruction is disallowed by the President as irrelevant, the honorable member may be able to attain his object by moving, by leave, or on notice, "That so much of the Standing Orders be suspended as would preclude the moving of the instruction." But this method is open to grave abuses, and I trust honorable members will not sanction it.

Debate continued.

Many amendments have been accepted in this House, which a strict reading of these rules would not allow. It is my duty as President first of all to carry out the practice of the House and to follow the precedents and If the Forests Bill consisted of only one clause, or dealt traditions that have been established. with only one subject amending the Forests Act, I would have grave doubts whether the introduction of a fresh subject would be relevant or permissible. I have no doubt, however, that

this Bill is a Bill generally amending the Forests Acts. It amends at least nine different sections or parts of sections of the Principal Act. Therefore, in my opinion, the words used by May which have been read referring to endowing a Committee with power to perfect and complete the legislation defined by the contents of a Bill, or to extend the provisions of a Bill to cognate objects apply in this particular case. I think the power to extend the Bill to cognate objects brings this proposal within the rules as to relevancy. It is also perhaps desirable that I should read our own standing order No. 213, which says-

"An instruction empowers a Committee of the whole Council to consider matters not otherwise referred to them.

I think that this Standing Order deliberately contemplates instructions upon such matters as the one brought forward to-night. The question of control of timber upon roads is dealt with in the principal Act and if nine major subjects in the principal Act are proposed to be amended by the Bill, I think it is in accordance with the custom and practice of this House to permit the introduction of a tenth object such as this is. In my opinion, therefore, the relevancy is sufficient to permit of an instruction being given.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

- 9. (1) Whenever required by the Commission or by any person thereto authorized in writing by the Commission (either generally or in any particular case)—
 - (a) the owner of every saw-mill on private land shall furnish in the prescribed manner such information and particulars as are required from him concerning the output of timber of all classes and species from such saw-mill; and
- (2) Every owner of a saw-mill aforesaid shall forthwith fill up any form sent to or left with or for him for the purposes of this section.
 - (3) Any owner of a saw-mill aforesaid who in contravention of this section—
 - (a) refuses or fails to forthwith furnish information and particulars when required to do so pursuant to this section; or
 - (b) fails or refuses to forthwith fill up any form sent to or left with or for him for the purposes of this section; or
 - (c) furnishes information or particulars which is or are not correct—

shall be guilty of an offence against the Principal Act.

(4) The forms which are required to be filled in for the purposes of this section shall from time to time be prepared by the Commission and approved by the Governor-in-Council.

(5) The provisions of section sixty-five of the Forests Act 1918 with respect to regulations shall extend and apply to the making of any regulations prescribing any matters or things necessary or convenient to be prescribed for carrying into effect the objects of this section.—(Hon. W. J. Beckett.)

No. 3.—HEALTH BILL.—Clause 12 (as amended).

- 12. (1) After the expiration of six months from the commencement of this Act no person shall keep a butcher's shop or a fishmonger's shop unless the same is registered with a Council.
- (2) If any butcher's shop or fishmonger's shop is not so registered or if there is with respect thereto any contravention of or failure to comply with the Health Acts or the regulations the proprietor thereof shall be guilty of an offence against the *Health Act* 1919.
 - (3) The council may make regulations for or with respect to—
 - (a) the inspection of butchers' shops and of fishmongers' shops;

(b) the drainage thereof;

(c) the provision of suitable sanitary conveniences therefor;

(d) the supply of water thereto;

(e) the provisions for lighting and ventilation of the premises;

(f) the maintenance of the premises in a proper state of repair;

- (g) the provision of suitable stores for the keeping and storage of meat or fish properly constructed situated and ventilated and sufficient in capacity;
- (h) requiring that such stores shall be so constructed and maintained as to exclude flies and rodents and other vermin therefrom;

(i) the cleansing of all utensils;

(j) regulating the carrying on at any butcher's shop or fishmonger's shop of any business connected therewith or ancillary thereto; and

(k) generally, carrying into effect the purposes of this section.

- (4) Save as otherwise expressly provided in the regulations, all such regulations shall apply with respect to all butchers' shops and fishmongers' shops whether constructed before or after the commencement of this Act.
- (5) The provisions of Part XIV. of the *Health Act* 1919 shall extend and apply with respect to registrations under this section.
- (6) The provisions of Part XV. of the *Health Act* 1919 relating to regulations of the Governor in Council thereunder shall extend and apply to the making of regulations under this section and to such regulations when made.
 - (7) In this section unless inconsistent with the context or subject-matter-
 - "Fishmonger's shop" does not include any fishmonger's shop which is registered as an eating house under division three of Part X. of the *Health Act* 1919.
 - "Proprietor" of a butcher's shop or of a fishmonger's shop includes the owner the occupier or any person having the management or control thereof.

- (8) This section shall be read and construed as in aid and not in derogation of the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts and the regulations thereunder relating to the like subject-matter.
- (9) This section shall apply to cities and towns; and the Governor in Council may by proclamation extend and apply this section to any borough or to any shire or part thereof; and any proclamation under this sub-section may be repealed amended or varied by proclamation of the Governor in Council, and any proclamation as so amended or varied shall take effect accordingly.

REPORT.

The Select Committee appointed by your Honorable House on the 23rd November, 1927, and to which was referred "A Bill to amend the Law relating to Apprenticeship and for other purposes" have the honour to report as follows:—

1. Your Committee met five times and heard evidence from representatives of the Victorian Chamber of Manufactures and the Melbourne Trades Hall Council. In view of the little time available to the Committee, it being their desire to furnish a Report at the earliest date so that there might be an opportunity this Session in which to deal with the proposed legislation, it was not considered necessary to call further witnesses, the evidence submitted being sufficient to cover the provisions of the Bill from all aspects.

STATEMENTS BY EMPLOYERS.

2. Representatives of the employers pointed out that this proposed legislation was fifteen or twenty years too late, as the Commonwealth Court of Conciliation and Arbitration had been constituted in recent years, and its awards regarding apprenticeship applied to many industries in Victoria and over-rode the State laws. A list prepared by the Victorian Chamber of Manufactures showing separately the trades under Federal Awards and the trades under Wages Board determinations not affected by Federal Awards is appended to this Report. These representatives said wages boards appointed in this State under the Factories and Shops Acts also fixed the number of apprentices, their hours, wages, and indenture conditions in most trades to which the Commonwealth awards do not apply. Consequently there are very few industries left to which the proposed Apprenticeship Bill, if enacted, would be applicable. The view of the employers was that until the Commonwealth Court of Conciliation and Arbitration withdrew from its awards any conditions relating to apprentices and improvers, or until that Court was prepared to recognize a Victorian enactment specially dealing with apprenticeship and made that law apply to its awards in this State, the Victorian Parliament ought not to pass the proposed Apprenticeship Bill. If there were three bodies to operate in regard to the employment of apprentices—the Commonwealth Court, the State Wages Boards, and the Commission to be appointed under the proposed Apprenticeship Act—it would cause confusion, be cumbersome in operation, and inflict on employers an unnecessary loss of time in studying and carrying out the provisions of that Act. Already about a third of the effective time of an employer had to be devoted to dealing with industrial laws and awards, causing a serious encroachment on the hours he should give to the questions of increasing production and expansion of business which would mean additional employment of men and youths. Competition in trade was keen and the manufacturer of to-day had necessarily to be constantly on the watch for labour-saving appliances to cheapen production and augment the output of his factory. This caused the use of more and more automatic or semi-automatic machines in mass production, so that in many industries the teaching of an apprentice the full details of the complete trade was now a thing of the past, the employé being limited to a particular branch of the trade.

OPINIONS OF THE EMPLOYES.

3. Mr. J. H. Bradshaw, Secretary of the Plasterers' Society, speaking for the trade unions of Victoria, stated that they generally approved of the Apprenticeship Bill, and desired it to be enacted with one or two slight alterations. He considered it was a workable measure, and added unless Victoria was going to lag behind the other States it was necessary to have this legislation so as to encourage apprenticeship and the training of craftsmen. At present there were many lads who could be taken into trades as apprentices, but employers were avoiding the obligation to teach them the trade. Some of the trade unions are now forced to appeal to the Commonwealth Court of Conciliation and Arbitration in regard to apprenticeship matters, but if this Bill became law they would not have recourse to that Court, being satisfied with the authority of the Apprenticeship Commission provided for in the Bill.

VIEWS OF THE COMMITTEE.

- 4. Your Committee, after considering the evidence, formed the opinion that the Bill should be passed with certain amendments set forth hereunder. Your Committee believe the Bill, if enacted, with the amendments suggested will be recognized and taken advantage of by the Commonwealth Court of Conciliation and Arbitration, and so remove one of the objections to the measure raised by the representatives of the Victorian Chamber of Manufactures.
- 5. Your Committee recommend that the administration of the Act be placed in the hands of the Department of Labour instead of the Education Department as proposed in the Bill. The former Department is in closer touch with industry, and, on the whole, its administration of the Factories and Shops Acts has been satisfactory. Your Committee, however, desire to stress the necessity of the gentleman to be appointed to the office of President of the Apprenticeship Commission having had experience of teaching in technical schools, so that the training of apprentices at those schools may receive prominence and sympathetic consideration from him.

Notwithstanding anything in section thirty-five of this Act no proceedings shall be taken against any person for an offence against this sub-section unless the Commission after notifying such person of the offence alleged against him and after considering any representations which may be made to the Commission in the matter whether by or on behalf of such person or by or on behalf of any other person or body of persons claiming to be interested in the matter recommends to the Minister that such proceedings be taken."
