

PROCEEDINGS ON BILLS.

Administration and Probate Duties: Bill relating to duties payable under the Administration and Probate Acts and to amend the said Acts—(Sir Alexander Peacock).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and read a first time, 18 Dec., 1914, p. 23; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No 8) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair—Standing Orders suspended and resolution reported and agreed to, 21 Dec., p. 29; Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 21 Dec., p. 31; the Council's agreement notified, 21 Dec., p. 32. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No. 2565.)

ALBERT PARK LAND: Bill to revoke the permanent reservation and Crown grant of portion of certain land situate in the municipal districts of the City of South Melbourne and the City of St. Kilda as a site for a public park—(Mr. Hutchinson for Mr. Lawson).—Initiated and read a first time, 21 Dec., 1914, p. 30; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Dec., p. 37.—Bill not returned from the Council.

APPROPRIATION: Bill to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the service of the year ending on the thirtieth day of June, One thousand nine hundred and fifteen, and to appropriate the supplies granted in this and the last preceding Session of Parliament—(Sir Alexander Peacock).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Dec., 1914, p. 36; the Council's agreement notified, 23 Dec., p. 43. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No. 2570.)

CORONERS: Bill intituled "An Act to amend the "Coroners Act 1911" — (Mr. Muckinnon). — Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 17 Dec., 1914, p. 21; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 22 Dec., p. 37. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No. 2567.)

CRIMINAL APPEAL: Bill to provide for appeals in criminal cases and for other purposes—(Mr. Mackey).—Initiated and read a first time, 9 Dec., 1914, p. 10; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 10 Dec., p. 12; the Council's agreement to the Bill with an amendment notified; amendment agreed to, 21 Dec., p. 32. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No. 2564.)

CROWLAND AND NAVARRE RAILWAY CONSTRUCTION TRUST (INDEMNITY): Bill to indemnify the members of the Crowland and Navarre Railway Construction Trust for not repaying moneys obtained by overdraft of current account in a certain bank within two years of the constitution of such trust and for other purposes—(Mr. Mackinnon).—Initiated and read a first time, 22 Dec., 1914, p. 35; order for second reading read, whereupon Mr. Speaker said, "In my opinion, this is a Private Bill"; motion, by leave, That all the

Private Bill Standing Orders be dispensed with, and that this Bill be treated as a Public Bill-question resolved in the affirmative; Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Dec., p. 37; the Council's agreement notified, 23 Dec., p. 43. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No. 2-73.)

FOODSTUFFS AND COMMODITIES: Bill to continue the Foodstuffs and Commodities Act 1914—(Mr. Mackinnon).—Initiated and read a first time, 21 Dec., 1914, p. 30; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Dec., p. 38; the Council's agreement notified, 23 Dec., p. 43. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No. 2572.)

HAWKERS AND PEDLERS: Bill to amend the Hawkers and Pedlers Act 1890—(Mr. Murray).—Initiated and read a first time, 21 Dec., 1914, p. 30; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Dec., p. 37; the Council's agreement notified, 23 Dec., p. 42. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No. 2.69.)

INCOME TAX: Bill to declare the rates of income tax for each of the five years ending on the thirtyfirst day of December, One thousand nine hundred and nineteen, and to amend and continue the Income Tax Acts—(Sir Alexander Peacock).— Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and read a first time, 18 Dec., 1914, p. 25; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 7) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair—Standing Orders suspended and resolution reported and agreed to, 21 Dec., p. 29; Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 21 Dec., p. 31; an amendment in the Bill suggested by the Council; suggested amendment not made, 23 Dec., p. 44; the Council's agreement to the Bill notified, 23 Dec., p. 46. 1914. Act No. 2576.) (Assented to 30 December,

Initiated and read a first time, 22 Dec., 1914, p. 35; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Dec., p. 38; the Council's agreement notified, 23 Dec., p. 43. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No. 2574.)

JUSTICES: Bill to amend the Justices Act 1904 as to default summonses—(Mr. Mackinnon).—Initiated and read a first time, 3 Dec., 1914, p. 6; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 9 Dec., p. 10; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Dec., p. 37.—Bill not returned from the Council.

Land Tax: Bill to declare the rate of land tax for the year ending the thirty-first day of December, One thousand nine hundred and fifteen, and to amend the Land Tax Acts—(Sir Alexander

Peacock).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and read a first time, 18 Dec., 1914, p. 25; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 21 Dec., p. 31; the Council's agreement notified, 21 Dec., p. 32. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No. 2566.)

MUNICIPAL ENDOWMENT: Bill relating to municipal endowment—(Sir Alexander Peacock).—
Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 3) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair—Standing Orders suspended, resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 15 Dec., 1914, p. 14; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 18 Dec., p. 25; the Council's agreement notified, 21 Dec., p. 31. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No. 2562.)

MURRAY RIVER WATERS: Bill to ratify and provide for carrying out an agreement entered into between the Prime Minister of the Commonwealth of Australia and the Premiers of the States of New South Wales, Victoria, and South Australia, and for other purposes—(Mr. Machinnon).—Initiated and read a first time, 10 Dec., 1914, p. 11; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 2) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue and of imposts for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair—Standing Orders suspended and resolution reported and agreed to, 15 Dec., p. 14; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 16 Dec., p. 18.—Bill lapsed.

PRICE OF GOODS: Bill to amend and continue the Price of Goods Act 1914-(Mr. Mackinnon) .-Initiated and read a first time, 21 Dec., 1914, p. 30; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time-debate adjourned, 22 Dec., p. 38; debate resumed - Bill read a second time, on division, and committed; considered in Committee and reported with amendments; Standing Orders suspended and report received; amendments agreed to and Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 23 Dec., p. 41; the Council's agreement to the Bill with amendments notified; amendments considered—one agreed to, the other disagreed with, 23 Dec., p. 45; the Council do not insist on their amendment in clause 2 disagreed with by the Assembly, 23 Dec., p. 46. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No 2577.)

Public Service: Bill to further amend the Public Service Acts — (Mr. Murray).—Initiated and read a first time, 21 Dec., 1914, p. 30.—Bill lapsed.

RATING ON UNIMPROVED VALUES: Bill to amend section 2 and section 4 of the Rating on Unimproved Values Act 1914—(Mr. Hutchinson for Mr. Lawson).—Initiated and read a first time, 21 Dec., 1914, p. 30; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Dec., p. 37; the Council's agreement notified, 23 Dec., p. 43. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No. 2571.)

SCAFFOLDING INSPECTION: Bill to provide for the inspection of scaffolding and for other purposes—
(Mr. Elmslie).—Initiated and read a first time,
9 Dec., 1914, p. 10.—Bill lapsed.


SEED ADVANCES: Bill to enable seed and fodder to be advanced on certain terms to cultivators of land and for other purposes—(Mr. Lawson).—Message

from His Excellency the Governor (No. 4) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair-Standing Orders suspended, resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 15 Dec., 1914, p. 15; read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with an amendment; Standing Orders suspended and report received; amendment agreed to and Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 18 Dec., p. 25; an amendment in the Bill suggested by the Council and made by the Assembly, 22 Dec., p. 38; the Council's agreement to the Bill (including the amendment made by the Assembly which was suggested by the Council) notified, 22 Dec., p. 39. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No. 2568.)

SEWERAGE DISTRICTS: Bill to make provision for sewerage districts and the sewering thereof—(Mr. Hutchinson).—Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 5) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue and of fines, penalties, and forfeitures for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair-Standing Orders suspended, resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 15 Dec., 1914, p. 15; read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with amendments; Standing Orders suspended and report received; amendments agreed to and Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 18 Dec., p. 25; the Council's agreement to the Bill with amendments notified, 23 Dec., p. 41; amendments considered-some agreed to, others disagreed with, and others agreed to with amendments. 23 Dec., pp. 42-3; the Council agree to the amendments of the Assembly on the amendments of the Council, insist on some of their amendments disagreed with by the Assembly, and do not insist on others of the said amendments; Message from the Council considered and debate thereon adjourned, 23 Dec., pp. 44-5; debate resumed and again adjourned, 23 Dec., pp. 45-6.— Bill lapsed.

STAMP DUTIES: Bill to further amend the Stamps Acts-(Sir Alexander Peacock).-House resolves itself into Committee of the whole to consider certain stamp duties; matter considered in Committee; Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair-Standing Orders suspended and report received; resolution specifying the several stamp duties to be paid on certain instruments reported and agreed to and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 21 Dec., 1914, p. 30; read a second time and passed remaining stages without Legislative amendment; concurrence of the Council desired, 21 Dec., p. 31; the Council's agreement notified, 23 Dec., p. 43. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No. 2575.)

TREASURY BONDS: Bill to authorize the issue of Treasury bonds—(Sir Alexander Peacock).—
Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 6) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair—Standing Orders suspended, resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 16 Dec., 1914, p. 17; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 18 Dec., p. 26; the Council's agreement notified, 21 Dec., p. 31. (Assented to 30 December, 1914. Act No 2563.)


